

TRUSTS DISSOLVING, SAYS WICKERSHAM

Ex - Attorney - General Says
People Will Tire of Owning
Competing Stock.

PATIENCE IS ENJOINED

Process of Building Up That Re-
quired 20 Years Not to Be Un-
done by Wave of Hand
of Enchanter.

NEW YORK, March 7.—George W. Wickersham, ex-Attorney General of the United States, in an address before the Nassau County Bar Association tonight, said that the division of the Standard Oil and Tobacco Companies under the Sherman law had been effective, despite the belief of many to the contrary.

Mr. Wickersham said that undue confidence in the immediate results of anti-trust legislation had blinded the public to what had really been accomplished against monopolistic corporations.

Combine Is Forbidden.

"But these companies were separated and forbidden by the court to combine anew, and in the case of the tobacco companies forbidden to have common officers, common directors or common agents."

"I said at the time of the dissolution that those facts inevitably would lead to a further severance of interest. Large holders, finding that competition between the companies could not be prevented, would sell their holdings in some of the companies and concentrate their interests in one company or two or more that were not in competition with each other. The critics were impatient. They could not wait results and much misrepresentation and public misunderstanding followed."

Dissolution Still Going On.

"But the process I foresaw has been going on and still is. The Rockefeller interests have sold their stock in the Waters-Pierce refinery to the Henry Clay Pierce interests. Shortly after the dissolution of the tobacco trust, its stock in United Cigar Stores Company was sold to outside interests. The Reynolds company increased its stock from seven to twenty millions, and the 29 individual defendants—the men who had built up and controlled the trust—were enjoined from increasing their holdings. The increased stock went into other hands. James B. Duke has centered his interest largely in the British-American Company. I don't know precisely to what extent the other holders of the tobacco stocks have segregated their interests, but I know the process is going on."

Process Takes Time.

"People will get tired of running one company in competition with another and yet holding stock in both. There must come a time when they will voluntarily separate their interests and independent ownership and actual competition follow."

GERMAN WOMEN ACTIVE

Number of Students of Fair Sex in
Universities Increases Fast.

BERLIN, March 5.—The number of women students at German universities has been nearly quadrupled during the past six years, according to figures just announced. In the winter of 1908, when the doors of German universities first were fully thrown open to women, there were 1168 women students enrolled. There are now 4680 women taking regular courses and as many more are attending lectures. More than 6 per cent of the total number of students at the German universities are women. More than half of all the women are studying philosophy, languages and history; somewhat more than one-fourth are studying medicine, and more than one-fifth natural sciences.

CANADA INCREASES 356,430

Immigration Shows Americans Are
Pouring into Dominion.

OTTAWA, Canada, March 5.—The total immigration to Canada during the first 10 months of the current year, according to a statement issued by the Department of the Interior, was 356,430, made up of 135,179 British, 92,539 Americans and 127,712 from all other countries.

CHICAGO WOMEN CENSORS

New Board of Movie Inspectors Is
Now Installed.

CHICAGO, March 5.—The new Board of Film Censors appointed recently by Mayor Harrison is keeping regular office hours. The five women and one man who compose the board visited

several moving picture establishments and approved several films.

"The appointments of Mayor Harrison are excellent persons," said Major M. L. C. Funkhouser, Second Deputy Superintendent of Police, who has charge of the board. "It must be understood, however, that the decisions of the censors are not final. The power of my office is to reject or allow the films to be shown. I am therefore responsible for the acts of this board, and I am not going to shirk the responsibilities of my office."

"The moving picture men are using every device at their disposal to attract me, but I have in two scrapbooks here the indorsements of organizations representing 500,000 persons. The societies which have voluntarily passed resolutions indorsing my work are of all kinds—Catholic, Protestant, Jewish and nonsectarian. I feel that this proves that I have the support of the best people in the city."

PREJUDICE IS OVERCOME

RED CROSS DECLARED TO HAVE
HELPED BRIDGE RACE GAP.

Balkan Wars Show Combatants Are
Really Grateful for Kindly Treat-
ment of Wounded.

NEW YORK, March 7.—In reviewing today the work done by the American Red Cross Society in the recent Balkan Wars, Miss Mabel T. Boardman, president of the society, in an address at the Saturday afternoon luncheon of the Republican Club, spoke of the civilizing influence of the Geneva convention, asserting that race prejudice was eliminated to a noteworthy degree by the activities of Red Cross workers.

WOMEN TOO NUMEROUS

ENGLISH THINK MARRIAGE IS
CURE FOR SUFFRAGETTES.

Shortage of Wives Reported in All
Parts of Empire, Says Royal Com-
mission in Review.

LONDON, March 5.—(Special.)—In an unflattering pamphlet concerning the suffragette agitation, Sir Almoth Wright advanced the suggestion that the true reason for the superiority of women in England—was for the superfluous ones to remove themselves to the Dominions and marry there. This is the true reason, he says, for the shortage of wives reported in all parts of the Empire, says the Royal Commission in Review.

PARIS STILL MAY GAMBLE

Bill to Kill Engleish in Senatorial
Commission Fails to Carry.

PARIS, March 5.—An effort to pass restrictive legislation about gambling in France brought to naught by the Senatorial commission sitting on the bill passed by the Chamber forbidding a gambling casino within 100 kilometers of Paris by a majority of 11 to 7. The commission thus saved the life of the popular gambling resort at Engleish, close to Paris, where millions of francs are lost yearly by the inhabitants of Paris.

COUNTLESS STIRS SOCIETY

Lady Somerset Puts Ban on Plumes
in Pointed Remark.

LONDON, March 5.—The Countess of Warwick astonished a gathering made up largely of society recently by a remark in which she said she never wears feathers or the plumage of birds or furs, owing to the cruelty of the fur trade, adding:

"I do not wear dead birds or beasts hung around me as a decoration."

The Countess was speaking in support of the movement for bird preservation.

AND FOR ROADS AND SCHOOLS PROPOSED

Idaho Senator Would Devote
Entire Forestry Proceeds
to Work in States.

DIVISION IS SPECIFIED

Bill is Based on Theory That Re-
serves Reduce Taxable Areas of
States, Which, in Justice,
Deserve Recompense.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 7.—A bill introduced by Senator Brady, of Idaho, proposes to turn over to the states all moneys received from forest reserves, these funds to be used for the construction of roads and the support of schools. At present most of the forest reserve revenue goes into the Federal Treasury and only a small percentage is given to states.

SPOKANE CASH IS MORE

CURRENCY ON HAND AND IN OTHER
BANKS ABOVE FORMER CALL.

Deposits Are Slightly Less and Loans
and Discounts Show About Million
Dollar Decrease Since 1913.

SPOKANE, March 7.—(Special.)—Spokane banks, furnishing the statement of their condition at the close of business, March 4, 1914, upon the call of the controller of currency today, have nearly \$1,000,000 more cash on hand and due from banks than they had on January 13, when the first call was issued. Only 15 institutions responded to the call this time, owing to the fact that the Northwest Loan and Trust Company has been consolidated with the Spokane & Eastern Trust Company.

RIBBON CLERKS HELPED

Tucson Dry Goods Merchant Invents
Ribbon Bolt Attachment.

TUCSON, Ariz., March 5.—(Special.)—Benefactor of ribbon clerks and their employers is the title that may be bestowed upon B. Rosefeld, a drygoods merchant of this city, who has invented a device for fastening the end of a bolt of ribbon. It does away with the eternal pinning and unpinning which has been the bane of the ribbon counter for generations.
