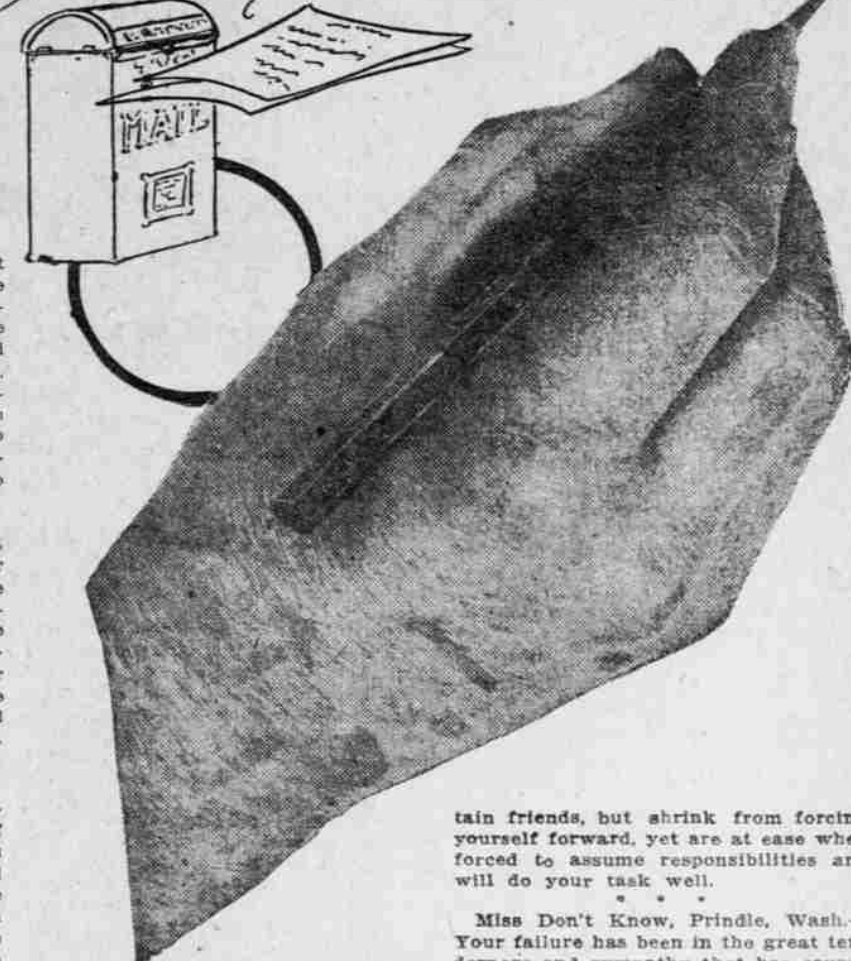


# WHAT YOUR PEN BETRAYS

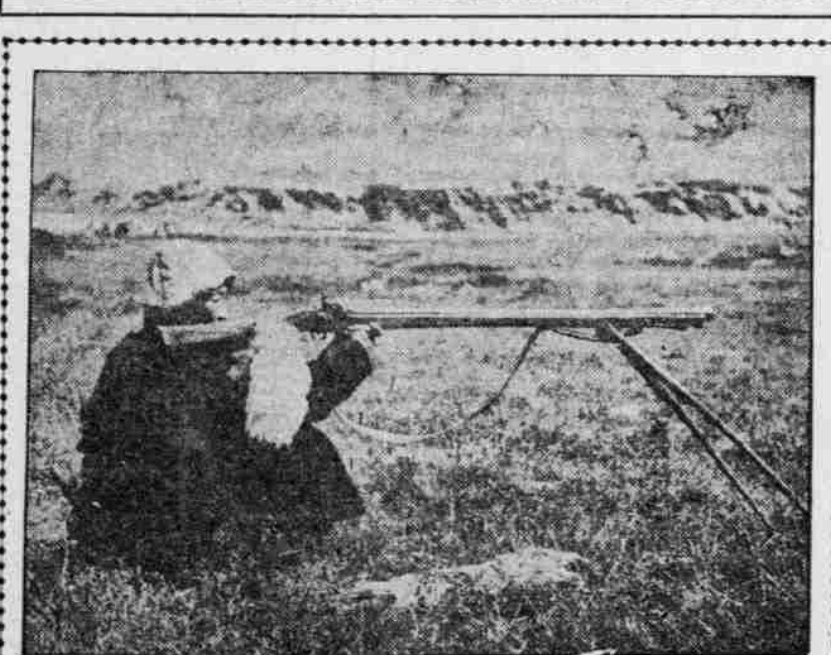
