

E. L. VAN DRESAR TO RUN FOR CONGRESS

Third District Nomination on Democratic Ticket Sought by Ex-Engineer.

ASPIRANT IS NOW IN EAST.

Candidate Announces Ambition by Telegram Read at Jackson Club Meeting—Judge Bennett Is One of Speakers.

Another candidate has entered the race for Congress from the Third District, comprising Multnomah County. He is E. L. Van Dresar, whose candidacy for the Democratic nomination was announced at the meeting of the Jackson Club in the rooms of the Portland Commercial Club last night.

Mr. Van Dresar, who is now in the East, announced himself in a telegram, which was read at the meeting.

"Accepting the inference that Judge Stevenson will not be a candidate," said the telegram, "I have arranged my business so as to permit my entering the race for Congress from the Third District of Oregon and shall return prepared for an active campaign, regardless of all opposition."

Mr. Van Dresar has lived in Portland since 1885. For some years he was a railroad engineer. He is now Pacific Coast agent of a New York railroad supply firm.

About two months ago at a meeting of trainmen, railway conductors and engineers he was asked to become a candidate for Congress, but at that time declined.

Though John H. Stevenson, Municipal Judge of Portland, has not yet announced his decision, he still is regarded by Democrats as a tentative candidate.

Judge A. S. Bennett, of the Dalles, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor, was a speaker at last night's meeting. He expounded Democratic doctrine.

He declared that if elected Governor he would give every person adequate protection, be he saloonkeeper or minister. His remarks were generally accepted as being directed against Governor West, when he said that "no person in authority, be he good king or bad king, has the right to take away a man's liberty or confiscate his property without due process of law and without giving that man a hearing."

A letter has been sent to members of the advisory committee of the Lincoln Republican Club by C. R. McInnes, its secretary. In part it is:

"Believing that the success of the Republican party in the forthcoming election depends upon the confidence and co-operation of the rank and file of Republicans, the Lincoln Republican Club, through its executive committee, issues this call for a meeting of its advisory committee at the office of Bro. Nathan & Bro. Nathan, Title & Trust Company building, Wednesday, March 25, 1914, 8 P. M., at which time the question of the advisability of a declaration of principles among progressive lines will be taken up."

George M. Brown, of Roseburg, candidate for the Republican nomination for Attorney-General, has been in Portland for several days in the interest of his candidacy. Mr. Brown, as District Attorney for 18 years of Douglas County, has made a wonderful record for law enforcement.

John Manning, Democratic candidate for Governor, has been campaigning this week in Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties. Today Mr. Manning will be in Salem, and he will return to Portland Sunday. He will next week in Lane, Linn and Marion counties. In the following week Mr. Manning will tour Eastern Oregon.

Members of the Gus C. Moser Booster Club had a meeting last night in Mr. Moser's campaign headquarters, 521 Tecon building. The meeting was called to hear reports from Moser workers, and to map out Mr. Moser's itinerary in Southern Oregon.

HENRY BOWE BURIED HERE

Victim of Train at New Westminster Leaves Relatives in Portland.

Henry Bowe, formerly of this city and whose relatives reside at 748 Front street, was run over by a Canadian Pacific train last Monday in New Westminster, B. C. His brother, Edward D. Bowe, brought the body to Portland and the funeral was held Thursday. Services were held in Finley's undertaking chapel. Burial was in Rose City Cemetery.

Bowe, who worked in the veneer department of the Fraser Mills at New Westminster, to save time jumped from the train while it was passing through the city. He landed on an embankment and rolled back under the wheels of the rear car. He was 25 and unmarried.

PREACHER-TENOR HEARD

REV. FRANK W. GORMAN WINS HIGH PRAISE AT RECITAL.

Pastor of Atkinson Memorial Church Appears at Lincoln High Auditorium in Artistic Programme.

In a recital that he gave Friday night in the Lincoln High School auditorium before a large, enthusiastic audience, Rev. Frank W. Gorman, pastor of Atkinson Memorial Church, East Twenty-ninth and East Everett streets, showed that he has a sweet, clear, well-trained tenor voice of artistic worth.

This is all the more remarkable when one considers that Mr. Gorman uses his speaking voice a good deal of the time in his duties as preacher and speaker at public meetings.

About one year ago, Mr. Gorman began his vocal studies under the direction of Mrs. Elsie Bond Blischoff, and during the interval has been a diligent vocal student. The result is that today he has one of the best, finely cultivated tenor voices in the Pacific Northwest.

His songs easily, naturally and expressively, while his diction and phrasing are admirable. Yet Mr. Gorman says that his vocal studies are by no means completed.

"I shall be a vocal student all my life. I have a high singing ideal to reach, and that means work," says this preacher-tenor. All who know Mr. Gorman, and his friends are many, are sure if he listens to those who wish him to give up the ministry and become a professional tenor, that he may be one of the best in the business.

Last night Mr. Gorman won out especially with two solos from Handel's "Messiah," "Comfort Ye" and "Every Valley," and Marshall's "I Hear You Calling Me" and "I Heard A Truth at Eve." He recalled several times, and among his encore numbers was the Scotch ballad "Mary of Argyle," finely sung.

Mr. Blischoff was an excellent piano accompanist. Mr. Gorman was assisted by Miss Margaret Fallenius, violinist, who played several solos with pleasing skill and finish. Miss Fallenius is steadily excelling in her art.

BOYS MOB WORSHIPERS

SECT THAT MAKES MUCH OF NEGRO PASTOR AROUSES IRE.

Citizens of Chico, Cal., Would Have Revival of "Pentecostal" Denomination Declared Nuisance.

Chico, Cal., March 21.—(Special.)—Armed with stones, clubs and revolvers loaded with blank cartridges, a gang of 40 small boys last night stormed a small house in which a religious sect similar to the Holy Rollers has been holding revival meetings in Chapman-town, a suburb. They battered the doors, broke all the windows and drove the 50 or more worshipers from the house.

This was the climax of several smaller riots instigated by the custom of the members of the congregation of throwing themselves under a hypnotic spell and kissing and otherwise showing affection for the negro pastor, who with a white evangelist has been conducting the meetings.

The leaders of the rioting boys were called on the carpet today by the District Attorney's office and turned over to the probation authorities for further investigation. The police quelled last night's rioting, but it is admitted that if they had not nipped the trouble in its early stages fathers and older brothers who are opposed to the meetings would have taken matters in their own hands.

Residents of the section will circulate a petition to have the meetings declared a public nuisance. The revivalists are of a sect known as "Pentecostal."

Mr. Epperson was formerly a resident of Portland. He had lived in Oregon and Washington for about 25 years. He is survived by one son and three daughters.

BIG PARADE IS BOOSTED

AUXILIARY ASSOCIATION FORMED TO TAKE FULL CHARGE.

City and State Will Be Asked to Proclaim June 12 a Legal Holiday in City.

The original 52 organizations which created the Rose Festival Association in its present form met with nearly as many more clubs and societies at the Multnomah Hotel Friday night and formed an independent auxiliary association for the exclusive purpose of boosting the big day and its external parade on the closing day of the next celebration.

This co-operating body will take practically all the preliminary details of the parade and will guarantee to the Board of Governors and will guarantee to the Festival management the most comprehensive and representative street pageant ever held in Portland.

The organization was perfected with the selection of Charles F. Berg, president of the Ad Club, as permanent chairman. M. E. McFaul, president of the East Side Business Men's Club, and Mrs. R. E. Bondurant, prominently identified with half a dozen of the leading women's organizations of the city, as vice-chairmen, and Jacob Kandler, president of the Progressive Business Men's Club, as secretary.

At the meeting discussed was the plan to petition the City Commissioners to proclaim a legal holiday, closing up all forms of business during the afternoon of June 12, the day of the parade. Governor West will also be asked to declare a state legal holiday, so that the scores of fraternal and similar organizations who may wish to compete for the big prizes may have full opportunity to send their representatives here, both as participants and spectators.

More than 30 delegates gave brief talks on behalf of their clubs and the indications are that the liveliest kind of rivalry will be precipitated among the fraternal, civic and business bodies in and outside of Portland.

The auxiliary association will meet again in two weeks to receive definite entries from the affiliated members.

COLLEGE DRYS TO MEET

CONFERENCE TO BE HELD DAY AFTER ORATORICAL CONTEST.

Preparations Being Made at Pacific Institution at Newberg for Session to Be Held April 11.

NEWBERG, Or., March 21.—(Special.)—Preparations are being made for a conference of the Intercollegiate Prohibition Association in connection with the annual oratorical contest to be held at Pacific College, April 10. Heretofore the annual gathering has consisted only of the contest and the annual business meeting, but this year there is to be a conference that will continue all day Saturday following the contest, and which will be addressed by some of the leading men in the college prohibition movement in the West.

Secretary John F. Leggett, of the State Association, will give his annual report of the work of the association for the past year, and the state president, Herbert R. York, of Pacific College, also will give his report. Addresses will be made by Professor Curtis P. Coe, of McMinnville College, editor of the Pacific Patriot; Levi T. Pennington, president of Pacific College; Harry Platz, traveling secretary of the Intercollegiate Prohibition Association for the Pacific Coast, and others.

Seven colleges will be in the state prohibition contest. They are McMinnville College, Pacific College, Albany College, Dallas College, Pacific University, Eugene Bible University and Willamette University.

Lisle Hubbard, who won second place in the regular oratorical contest, will represent Pacific College in the prohibition contest.

ATTACK ON MAYOR DENIED

Mr. Daly Says He Didn't Compare Mr. Albee to Jellyfish.

City Commissioner Daly on Friday declared that he was misquoted and misrepresented by the Daily News in an article purporting to be an interview with regard to his opinion of Mayor Albee.

Among other things the News says Mr. Daly said "our Mayor isn't a Mayor at all, at least not fit for one. He is minus backbone as a jellyfish," and has about as much will power and brains as a new-born babe."

Mr. Daly says he has said nothing that could lead to such an article. "As a matter of fact I have a high regard for Mayor Albee," he said.

GAMBLING CASE DISMISSED

Lack of Specifications Frees Chinese Taken in Raid.

After a jury had been drawn in Municipal Court to try Lung Fong and nine others for gambling, Attorney Magus discovered Friday that the

complaint did not specify a particular form of gambling, which the ordinance calls for, and asked that the case be dismissed. Judge Stevenson granted the demurrer and the defendants were freed.

Fantam beans and rakes and 50 cents were found on the gambling tables by the police who raided the place, but they were unable to say just what game was being played. So the complaint was made to read "a certain game of chance." The ordinance says what games of chance are gambling under the city law, and this narrowing of the field gave the verdict to the defense.

CRIMINAL LIBEL CHARGED

Cathlamet Mayor and Councilman Accuse Paper Publisher.

CATHLAMET, Wash., March 21.—(Special.)—Complaint was filed today of a series of attacks on the motives and public life of M. Gorman, Mayor of this city, and Jay Gibson, a member of the City Council, criminal complaint was filed in the Superior Court here today by William Stuart, prosecuting attorney for Wahkiakum County, against J. G. Bailey, owner and publisher of the Columbia River Sun, charging criminal libel.

Mr. Gorman is president and Mr. Gibson is cashier of the Wahkiakum County Bank.

Mr. Bailey bases his grievance on the non-payment of a city warrant in his favor for an unpaid bill for printing. He was held to the Superior Court in \$1000 bail, which he is now endeavoring to obtain.

SHERIFF WORD RAIDS CAFES

Patrons and Proprietors of Alleged Gambling Resorts Taken.

Raids on alleged gambling resorts were made by Sheriff Word and deputies Friday night when J. J. Russell and 12 patrons of Fritz & Russell's cafe, at Second and Burnside, were arrested and taken to the County Jail. Russell was released under \$100 bail, while \$10 each secured the liberty of the patrons.

Further raids were made at Rhoads' cafe, Second and Burnside, where E. E. Davenport, as manager, was arrested with 15 patrons who were charged with gambling. They were released on bail. M. J. Gardner, manager of a cafe at 257 First street, was also arrested on a similar charge with three patrons. They were released on bail.

TRAIN HOLDUP IS FOILED

Seattle-Tacoma Car Motorman Defies Men and Speeds On.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 21.—An attempt by two masked and armed men to hold up a Tacoma-bound interurban train at South Side station, near the scene of the interurban robbery the night of February 21, when passengers lost \$250, was foiled tonight by W. J. Fox, the motorman, who disregarded the highwaymen's orders to hold up his hands and sent the train away at full speed before the men could board it.

One passenger who alighted at the station was afterwards robbed of \$2.15 by the disappointed highwaymen. The train the men attempted to hold up tonight was the same one that was held up last month.

FRANCE DAMAGED BY GALE

Torrential Rains, Fierce Winds, Come With First Day of Spring.

PARIS, March 21.—The first day of Spring was heralded by fierce north-westerly gales and a torrential rain. Enormous damage resulted in Paris and in the North of France.

At the Vill. Coublay military aviation field the damage amounted to \$70,000. Four aeroplanes were wrecked.

No ships were able to leave Brest yesterday. A wireless dispatch received here reported that the steamship Henry in a critical situation 80 miles off Brest harbor with her engines broken down. Numbers of fishing boats were reported missing at different ports.

CONDUCTOR FOILS ROBBER

Hands Up Encounter Bell Rope and Man's Courage Oozes.

MACON, Ga., March 21.—A train conductor's coolness foiled a masked robber who attempted last night to hold up and rob passengers on a Southern Railway train known as the Ohio-Florida special, near Floyville, Ga.

The robber stepped into a car with drawn revolver and ordered passengers to throw up their hands. The conductor, who was one of those covered, pulled the bell cord. The robber's courage failed and he backed off the train when it stopped.

COMPANY E GIVES RECEPTION.

Company E, Oregon National Guard, tendered an informal reception and dancing party to the friends and relatives of its members in the Armory last night. About 50 were present.
