Former Wife of Minister Says
She Communicated No Doc-
ument to Figaro.

M. ROCHETTE IS FOUND

Man Who Swindled French People
of Millions Writes Letter Indi-
cating He Is at Present
in Switzerland.

PARIS, March 28.—Henri Rochette, the man alleged to have swindled the French public out of enormous sums, is believed to be in Switzerland. Several ex-French Cabinet ministers are now being examined by an investigating committee of the Chamber of Deputies in consequence of charges of bringing influence to bear to have Rochette's trial postponed. Rochette, meanwhile, escaped from France after he had been admitted to bail and was supposed to have fled to Mexico.

Jean Jaurès, the Socialist leader, who is in charge of the investigation, received yesterday through the mail a letter dated Lucerne, Switzerland, signed "Henri Rochette" and containing a declaration that he was known to have been written by Rochette himself, showing that it was penned by the same hand.

Caillaux Divorce Recalled.
The letter induced ex-President Monis to make a further statement regarding his role in the postponement of the trial of Rochette.

M. Caillaux, according to the statement, went to the Socialist leader, and explained to him that Maurice Bernard, who had placed him (Caillaux) under an eternal obligation by the way in which he had conserved Caillaux's divorce suit, was overwhelmed with work, and that it appeared that a postponement of the Rochette case was necessary for him.

Further, according to M. Monis, Caillaux showed him an analysis of the issues of the French banks mentioned in Rochette's letter, the use of which would be likely to cause a financial crisis. M. Monis said he then agreed to M. Caillaux's request under the impression that it was to be a postponement for six weeks.

First Wife on Stand.
The investigation into the killing of M. Calmette, editor of the Figaro, by Mme. Caillaux, continued yesterday before Magistrate Henri Boudard. Mme. Guydon Dugue, ex-wife of M. Caillaux, said on her honor that she had never directly or indirectly communicated to M. Calmette any document concerning M. Caillaux.

Leon Bailly, editor of L'Intransigeant, testified that he had been a close friend of M. Calmette and that on March 12 read to Bailly the Fabre report and two papers known as "the green document," the diplomatic correspondence, the nature of which was adverse to M. Caillaux. The publication of this correspondence was considered impossible on account of its origin.

Calmette Tells of "Last Shot."
M. Bailly said he again saw M. Calmette March 14 and told him that he could obtain a copy of the Fabre report, but that he would not publish it in L'Intransigeant if M. Calmette were going to publish it in the Figaro.

M. Calmette, the witness asserted, said he had promised not to print the report, but that he hoped to obtain a release from this promise before Tuesday, the day fixed for the Rochette debate in the Chamber of Deputies. M. Calmette added, according to M. Bailly, "I shall then have fired my last shot. If after that the public is not satisfied," accompanying his remarks with a shrug of the shoulders.

Henry Bernstein, an intimate friend of M. Calmette, was also under examination yesterday.

Oregon Political Gossip

Judge W. W. McCredie Asked to Run for Circuit Court, But Declines.
Moses Aldred Make Campaign Plans.
A. M. Crawford Accepts Sellwood Invitation—News of the Candidates.

THOUGH he has been asked to run for the Republican nomination for Judge of Department No. 6 of the Circuit Court in a petition signed by more than 100 lawyers, Judge W. W. McCredie will not be a candidate. A statutory provision requires that a candidate for judge must have lived in the state three years, although many lawyers believe this requirement was nullified by a later constitutional amendment. For many years Portland has been Judge McCredie's place of business, but his actual legal residence here is about four months less than the required three years. He was formerly judge of the Superior Court at Vancouver, Wash. A petition in circulation asking George Stapleton to run for Circuit Judge.

A probable Progressive candidate for the State Senate from Multnomah County is J. D. Holbrook, president of the First National Bank of St. Johns, and state treasurer of the Progressive party.

Hugh T. Halbert, of St. Paul, state chairman of the Progressive party in Minnesota, was in Portland for a few hours Friday. He recently bought 10,000 acres of logged-off lands near Chehalis, Wash., and has just accompanied a party of Swiss immigrants here to colonize it. Mr. Halbert is an old friend of T. B. Neuhausen, who is Progressive state chairman in Oregon.

A definite announcement that he will not be a candidate for the Progressive nomination for United States Senator was made yesterday by A. E. Clark, who has been urged by many Progressives to run.

"The demands of my business are such that it is not possible for me to be a candidate," said Mr. Clark. "I feel that I cannot afford to give the time necessary to what will be virtually a six months' campaign. I make this announcement at this time so that members of the party may know that I am not even a receptive candidate for any office."

EDUCATORS CONFER AT REED COLLEGE

Seven Institutions of State
Represented at Session of
Heads and Faculties.

STUDENTS SEEN AT WORK

Afternoon Meeting Hears Discussion
of A. B. Requirements and Need
of Psychological Tests for
Prospective Pupils.

Twenty delegates, including college presidents and faculty representatives from seven Oregon colleges, met Friday at Reed College in the annual conference of the presidents and faculties of the independent colleges of Oregon. The delegates inspected the buildings and equipment of Reed College and saw the Reed students at work in the classrooms and laboratories.

The first session was held at 4 o'clock and opened with prayer by Professor Boughton of McMinnville College. Dr. Thomas L. Elliot, president of the board of trustees of Reed College, gave the address of welcome.

President Pennington, of Pacific College, read a paper on "How the A. B. Degree Should Be Defined." He expressed himself as favoring a definition that was concrete, expressed in terms of actual work done in college in standard collegiate subjects. It should be impossible, he said, for any student to receive the degree without doing the work that he was supposed to do.

Psychological Tests Urged.
Dr. Eleanor Rowland, of Reed College, gave a talk on "Psychological Tests for Admission to College." Every college, she said, desires students who are of superior mental ability and who can profit most by the instruction the college has to offer. The plan of these tests is to examine the ability of the student rather than to find out how much knowledge he has accumulated on certain subjects. Miss Rowland gave a short report on tests that were given to Reed students last year, and said that the results were correlated with the grades received by the students in the regular college work.

It was found, she said, that in general the best students, according to the college grades, made the highest records in the tests, while the poorer students were also at the bottom of the list in the tests.

President Riley, of McMinnville College, spoke on "A Uniform Year for Oregon Colleges," and presented figures taken from college catalogues that showed the dates of opening and closing and the dates of the vacations.

After President Riley's talk a committee was appointed to prepare a calendar which, if adopted, will be put into effect after next year.

Reception Is Given.
The delegates were entertained at night at an informal reception tendered by President and Mrs. Foster. Later they attended the performance of three short plays by the College Dramatic Club.

At the chapel this morning President Crooks of Albany College, will speak. The conference sessions will follow and papers will be read by President Hoeman, of Willamette University; Miss Corinna Martin, of the State Library Commission; President Foster and Professor Griffin, of Reed College.

The delegates to the conference and the colleges represented are as follows: Pacific College, President Pennington and L. A. Mendenhall; Pacific University, President Bushnell and Professors Proctor, Farham, Bean and Bates; McMinnville College, President Riley, Professors Payne, Gardner, Northrup, Wallace and Boughton; Albany College, President Crooks, Miss Anderson and Frank; Philomath College, President Smith; Dallas College, Professor Metzger.

THIEF CHASER IS WOUNDED

Edward Nordberg Shot by His Own
Weapon When Climbing Fence.

Edward Nordberg, of East Elsie, second and Clayton streets, Gray's Crossing, was seriously wounded Friday morning by a shotgun in the hands of his own brother, who was hunting a chicken thief in their poultry yard. The gun was discharged when Karl started to climb a fence without putting on the safety lever.

The Nordbergs have some valuable fowls and they recently rigged an electric alarm, which would ring in their bedroom when the henyard was entered. It rang about 3 o'clock yesterday morning.

In the excitement following the shooting, the chicken thief made his escape. Nordberg, who is secretary of the National Hospital Association, in the Mohawk block, was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital by the Ambulance Service Company. He was operated on and is reported to be dangerously hurt.

QUEEN IS WARNED AWAY

to Visit United States.

SOFIA, March 28.—A letter was received at the palace today, warning Queen Eleanor not to carry out her purpose of visiting the United States.

It was announced Thursday in a dispatch from Sofia that Queen Eleanor would depart from Sofia for the United States the third week in May. It was her intent, the dispatch said, to make a study of the people and the institutions of the United States.

ARKANSAS RESULT CLOSE

With 4000 Out of 120,000 Votes Not
Returned, Clarke Leads by 468.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., March 28.—Whether United States Senator Clarke was renominated in the Democratic primary election of Wednesday or was defeated by William F. Kirby, Assistant Justice of the State Supreme Court, probably will not be learned until an official count of the ballots is made Monday.

With about 4000 of the estimated 120,000 votes in the election still unreported tonight, Senator Clarke had a lead of 468 votes.
