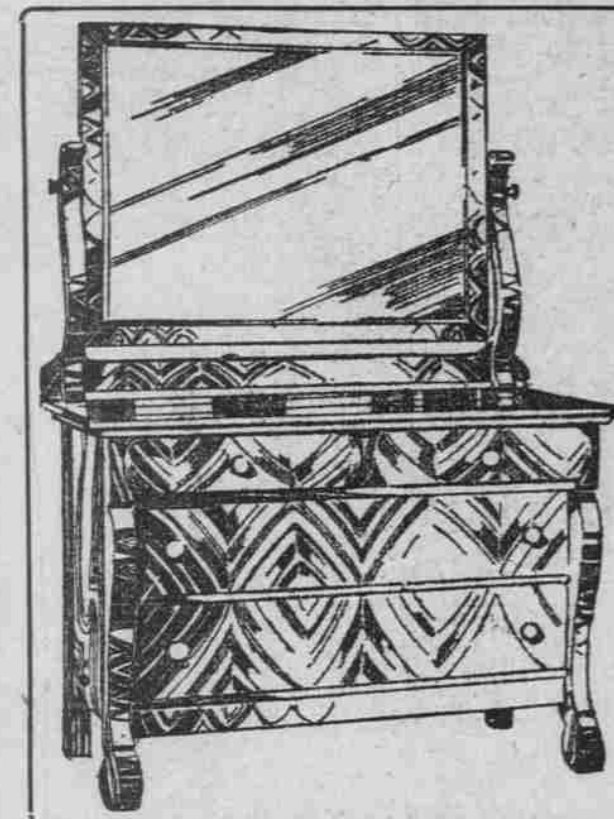

Convertible Into a Bed With Two Motions



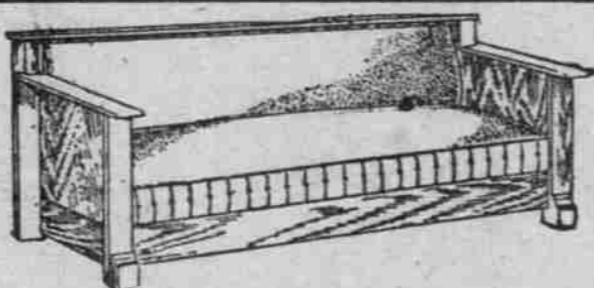

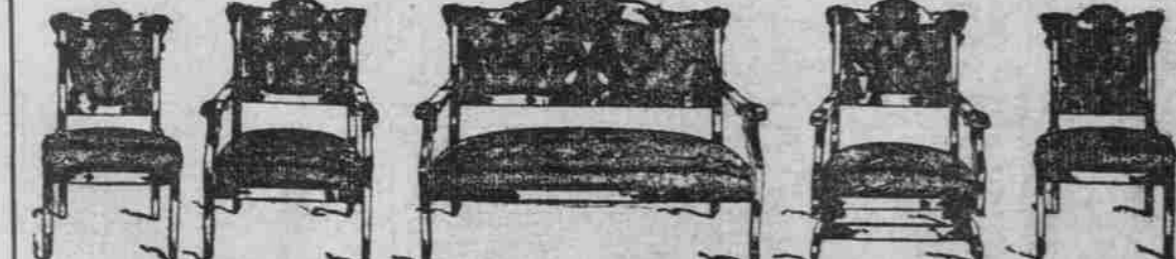

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11.—(Special.)—Walter McCredie staged the slaughter of the innocents at Recreation Park today, and after the San Francisco baseball public had laughed until its respective sides ached from the unusual exercise, the scores that was pinned up on the bulletin boards looked like this: San Francisco 14, Portland 4.

The slaughter of the innocents was a case of working recruit pitchers in the face of certain defeat. With Higginbotham literally battered out of the box in a little more than three innings, McCredie turned the engineering of the game over to a couple of his youngsters—Harold Peet, who hails from the Northwest, and Herb Salvesson, whose claim to fame is the fact that he was produced by that state.

It occurred to Herb.

The recruits, caught in the vortex of a storm, looked to be worried, and they played the part Peet left a legacy of a 5-0-3 score against him by Higginbotham found himself in sore trouble in the fifth, and what didn't happen to Harold, who was removed with two on the bases and one out, occurred to Herb Salvesson. 'Lefty' Leifield, never wasting a motion or taking an extra step, must have enjoyed the spectacle. He was out in front all the way from the first inning, when, with two on the bases, Mundorf dropped the ball out of sight over the right field fence.

Kores Bothered Lefty.
Kores, with a penchant for long-distance driving, caused the St. Louis twirler most of his bother, scoring once in the second, when he opened with a double, and again in the fourth, when the same Portlander laid the sphere away over the center field fence boards.

Once—just for a brief moment—the Beavers were as close as to 2, but they never had a chance after that, doubtless the reason that McCredie insisted on giving his novice a taste of life in the Wild West, when nobody lives, and the dogs bark at strangers.
