

SUFFRAGE BREACH IS NEARLY HEALED

National Leader Leaves City Before Conciliatory Message Is Prepared.

CHICAGO PARADE BIG ONE

Thousands of Women, Many Past 70, Participate in Demonstrations Designed in Part as Means of Thanking Lawmakers.

CHICAGO, May 2.—Suffrage day was celebrated today by the largest parade of women ever held in Chicago. Thousands of women, several of them past 70, many of them not yet 21, marched down Michigan avenue in 20 divisions. Formally, the parade was a means of thanking the State Legislature for voting suffrage to women and as Chicago's part in a National demonstration. The absence of Miss Jane Addams, acting president of the American National Suffrage Association, and Mrs. Joseph E. Bowen, another of the National officers, marred the harmony of the demonstration. A rupture between the National leaders and the state forces, led by Mrs. Grace Wilbur Trout, was nearly healed earlier in the day, when a message was prepared at suffrage headquarters similar to the resolution which the National Association had asked the state organization to approve.

Before the message was prepared Mrs. Bowen had left the city, declaring she could not consistently take her place in line with women who refused to take the action the National board requested. Miss Addams was at Cedarville, Ill., where her mother is ill.

Men Join Parade in Minneapolis.

MINNEAPOLIS, May 2.—The suffrage demonstration late today comprised a parade more than a mile long, followed by a mass meeting. Several men's organizations were in the parade, as were some 50 University of Minnesota women students in caps and gowns.

PACKERS ASK PROTECTION

Commission Urged to Guard Licenses Given Washington Fishermen.

ASTORIA, Or., May 2.—(Special.)—The Columbia River salmon packers have announced they will support the State Fish Commission in fighting the cases in the courts should State Fish Commissioner Darwin, of Washington, carry out his threat to arrest any of the Washington fishermen who fish in the Columbia River under Oregon licenses. This morning a letter was sent to the Oregon Fish Commission urging the state to protect the licenses issued by it, and the Attorney-General be instructed to conduct the defense if any arrests are made.

While not definitely stated, it is understood that if requested the packers will employ an attorney to assist the state in the defense. The packers also announce a rate of 7 cents a pound flat as the price that will be paid for salmon caught in the Willamette River.

COLONEL THANKS BRAZIL

Journey Full of Hardships and at Times Dangerous, Is Success.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, May 2.—Theodore Roosevelt has sent a dispatch from Manaus to Dr. Lauro Muller, the Brazilian Minister of Foreign Affairs, thanking him and the Brazilian government for their assistance during his stay in South America. In his communication to the Foreign Minister Colonel Roosevelt says: "The journey was one of hardships, and at times dangerous, but it was successful. For 35 days we struggled with the rapids of the river, and 10 days we were out of sight of human habitations. We followed the course of the river for more than 800 miles." Colonel Roosevelt will go to Para, at the mouth of the Amazon, on the Dunstan. At Para he will transfer to the steamer Pancrans for Barbados.

SAILORS START ON CRUISE

Naval Militia Leaves Aberdeen for Astoria on First of Series.

ABERDEEN, Wash., May 2.—(Special.)—Lieutenant A. E. Bradner and the fourth division of the Naval Militia left this afternoon on the torpedo-boat Fox for Astoria. The men will make the run tonight and will be in Astoria all day Sunday, returning home tomorrow night. This is the first long cruise which the Fox has made this summer and will be the first of a number of cruises to coast ports during the next few months. Lieutenant Bradner is planning another trip to Astoria and trips to Portland, Seattle and Tacoma. The trip to Astoria was started several weeks ago, but the sea proved too rough for the amateur sailors and they returned to port after they had gone a few miles beyond the entrance to the harbor.

P. Deteis, a fellow student. L. E. Appleton, a San Jose capitalist, father of the victim of the accident, said today he had no intention of prosecuting young Deteis.

POCATELLO, Idaho, May 2.—James Carr this afternoon shot and killed Mrs. G. D. Thayer, then shot her husband and fired a bullet into his own brain with fatal results. Thayer died an hour later. The shooting, according to the police, was the result of Carr's infatuation for Mrs. Thayer.

215 More Banks Enter System.
