

HOP ON A HOP TO FIGHT PROHIBITION

Organization Is Perfected at Salem to Combat Efforts Made for "Dry" State.

OFFICERS ARE SELECTED

Campaign Is Launched to Enlighten People on Value of Big Industry. Meetings Will Be Held in Hop Districts Each Week.

SALEM, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—Having for its purpose the safeguarding of the interests of the hop industry, and especially the combating of the effort to make Oregon a "dry" state the coming fall, 35 dealers and several growers perfected the organization of the Oregon Hopgrowers and Dealers' Association at a meeting here today.

It was the unanimous decision that the best way to secure the interests of the hopmen is to hold mass meetings in every hopgrowing section of the state before the November election.

The meetings are to be addressed by leaders of the industry. The first will be held next Saturday afternoon in Independence. Others will be held on following Saturdays in Aurora, Eugene and Hillsboro.

It was announced that organizations to work with the hopmen will be formed in all hopgrowing counties. In announcing the purpose of the association Hal V. Bolam, of this city, one of the secretaries, said:

Purpose Not One of Antagonism.—"This is the perfecting of an organization which started at a meeting of hopmen held in Portland several days ago. It is not our purpose to antagonize temperance people. The organization has no connection with the saloon or other liquor interests."

"The hop industry in this state represents more than \$5,000,000 and our association would consider it fatal to the state to see the industry swept away. Overzealous legislation, such as would put the state in the dry column, would be a great blow."

"We propose to hold mass meetings in every hopgrowing section between now and the election with a view to enlightening the voters in a dispassionate way who may labor under misconceptions as to the scope and extent of the industry."

"Should Oregon go 'dry' an enormous advantage would be given the other states voting on the question and the brewers naturally would patronize hopgrowers of states that are 'wet.' Our only outlet then for hops would be England, which takes on an average only about one-third of the annual production."

"We shall at our meetings call attention to the 50,000 persons who annually have an outing and at the same time make some money hop picking."

Portland Man Named President.

Mr. Bolam and a special committee were empowered to arrange the mass meetings.

NEWBERG, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—The Civic Improvement club, an auxiliary of the Commercial Club, is making arrangements for the annual rose festival, which is to be held Saturday, May 23. For several years these affairs have been given and have steadily grown in public favor.

Newberg is rich in roses and equally rich in babies and a year there is a display of both, the baby parade, with the little people in handsomely decorated baby carriages, always constituting one of the most attractive features of the rose festival.

A Parent-Teachers' Association was formed last week and gave its first entertainment, Thursday night. The affair was called "A Trip Round the World," which included visits to Ireland, Japan, Mexico, Germany and France, with a return to America. These countries were conveniently located at the homes of various persons. The round journey, comprising seven ment stores are now conducting sales.

SMUGGLING MAN IS CHARGE

Engineer and Fireman Held When Chinese Found in Toolbox.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., May 16.—Peter McGregor, engineer, and George Nelson, fireman, of the Northern passenger train, are being detained at Blaine by United States immigration officers on suspicion of having attempted to smuggle two Chinese into this country in violation of the immigration laws. The Chinese were taken from a locked toolbox on the engine at Blaine yesterday. Nelson was arrested, but McGregor was allowed to proceed to Seattle with his train and he returned this morning for a hearing late today before United States immigration Commissioner Montford.

PUPILS SPELL FOR TITLE

Clackamas County Winners to Determine Championship Today.

OREGON CITY, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—The Clackamas county spelling bee will be held tomorrow afternoon in the auditorium of the Oregon City high school. Representatives from each of the 17 districts will enter. In each of these districts a spelling bee has been held, and the champion of each will be the representative here. A cup has been offered by E. E. Brodie, editor of the Morning Enterprise, for the winner. The first debate was held the latter part of March and the last was held about two weeks ago at Wilsonville.

CHEHALIS DIGS 1365 WELL

State Training School Develops Daily Flow of 30,000 Gallons.

CHEHALIS, Wash., May 16.—(Special.)—The Washington State Training

School at Chehalis has recently completed a well 1365 feet in depth at a cost of \$2000. At a depth of 50 to 60 feet a splendid flow of fine water was encountered. The daily flow is estimated from 25,000 to 30,000 gallons. The original intention was to secure an artesian flow, but this was not accomplished, the water rising to within about 20 feet of the top. Pending completion of Chehalis' new gravity water system, work on which is now well under way, no arrangement will be made for using the water from the school's big well until the question of whether a suitable water rate from the city can be determined. The water from the well has been pronounced of splendid quality by the State Board of Health.

It has been reported that oil indications were struck during the boring.

NEW SALEM SCHOOL HEAD IS PROMINENT EDUCATOR



SALEM, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—Oliver M. Elliott, recently appointed superintendent of the Salem schools, is regarded as one of the most capable educators in the Northwest. He has been superintendent of the schools of Twin Falls, Idaho, for a number of years. There were more than 100 applicants for the Salem position. Mr. Elliott was born in Oregon and was increased from \$2400 to \$2750 in order to get Mr. Elliott to come to Salem. He plans many improvements in the public school system of the city.

MILLER IS ARRAIGNED

MOSCOW FIRM HEAD ALLOWED UNTIL MONDAY TO PLEAD.

Cases of Alleged Violations of Shipping Law May Not Be Tried Until Fall.

\$40 Awarded in \$3000 Suit.

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 16.—(Special.)—Just before the adjournment of the Federal Court tonight Mark P. Miller, president of a milling company indicted by the grand jury on charges of violations of the interstate commerce act, was arraigned and granted until Monday morning to plead by Judge Heltrick. Bond was fixed at \$2500 and the defendant permitted liberty on his own recognizance.

It is understood that the cases against Miller and the company will not be tried at the present term of court, but will come up for hearing next fall. H. B. Duncan, prosecuting attorney for the Interstate Commerce Commission, has gone to California.

Miller has issued a statement to the effect that the alleged violations of the interstate commerce act were technical errors which he expects to explain at his trial. The penalty on conviction in each count of which there are four, is from \$1000 to \$20,000, and not more than two years' imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

The jury in the Federal Court brought in a verdict of acquittal in favor of Tom Moxmo, charged with a liquor violation. The jury also returned a verdict of \$40 in the case of result of Alexander Munro against the producers of Mica Company, of Chicago.

POWER LINE EXTENDING

Washington Company Making Improvements in Idaho.

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 16.—(Special.)—Improvements involving an expenditure of a vast sum of money are being carried on by the Washington Water Power Company in this district. The company is maintaining a force of men here under B. H. Meade, foreman, in the construction of a substation to accommodate a transformer and catch its 66,000 volt power line now in course of construction from Palouse to Moscow.

Within a few days the high tension power line will have been constructed into Moscow and it is expected the company will extend its line through to Troy, Kendrick and Julietta the present year to serve those towns with light and power and also carry out the plan of connecting up with farm homes throughout this territory.

1000 TO WORK ON ROADS

Benton County Citizens Set Special Day Aside for Improvement.

CORVALLIS, May 16.—(Special.)—May 23 will be observed by Benton County as a county "Good Roads day." A committee of 17 men, selected from various parts of the county, met today for the purpose of organizing a permanent organization, and to work out plans for the work. A. I. Stevenson was selected chairman of the committee.

The county has been divided into six divisions and in each division there are four to six road districts. Each road district will be under the supervision of its own road supervisor. It is expected that 1000 citizens will work.

CONTRACTOR OPENS OFFICE

Grading Columbia Highway Near Astoria Soon Will Begin.

ASTORIA, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—The Boyalohn Arnold Company, which has been awarded the contract for clearing, grading and draining the portion of the Columbia Highway between this city and the east line of the county, near Westport, has opened an office in this city. The company is negotiating with sub-contractors and expects early in the coming week to sublet the greater portion if not all of the work by sections.

The intention is to begin active work within the next week or ten days.

CARNIVAL IS NEAR

Agricultural College to Hold Big Celebration.

PROGRAMME TO BE VARIED

Vaudeville Show, Ball Games, Circus and Field Meet Are Leading Features of Event to Be Held in Corvallis.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—Plans for the first annual athletic carnival to be held at the Oregon Agricultural College next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, are complete. The festival will open on Thursday night, when an informal "local talent" vaudeville show will be given in the college gymnasium. Each of the fraternities and clubs will stage skits and stunts of various sorts. All college classes have been ordered dismissed at 4 o'clock Friday and all day Saturday. Friday the University of Oregon ball team will cross bats with the local diamond artists. Friday night is to be "Gala night." A circus will be staged in the arena with thrilling feats, stunts, clowns, confetti and pink femorade will instill the spirit of revelry. Following the circus the ceremony of the crowning of the King and Queen of the carnival will be held. Miss Marie Hofer, of Salem, has been chosen as Queen. A King is yet to be selected.

On Saturday morning the women's gymnasium classes, under the direction of Miss Miriam Thayer, will present an elaborate dancing pageant on the campus lawn. Following this the second Oregon baseball game will take place. There will be held an open field meet Saturday, in which all of the colleges and athletic organizations of the Northwest will compete. The carnival will culminate Saturday night in a formal ball to be given by the Orange O Club in the gymnasium.

HIGH SCHOOL IS URGED

CAMPAIGN OF EDUCATION TO BE WAGED AT SANDY.
