

The best antacid is ordinary bisurated magnesia, which can be purchased at any drug store. This is not to act upon the stomach. But on the contents of the stomach. The antacid, as you can learn by consulting your dictionary or encyclopedia, is merely to neutralize or counteract the excess seid so the stomach can digest the food normality. Take it tesspoonful objurated magnesia in a little cold obtox water after each meal. You should get immediate relief, even if your case is severe. Careful, moderate eating and the use of bisurated magnesia should put your stomach in normal condition in a short time; if you have not allowed dyspepsia to advance to the extreme stage of developing stomach ulcers.—Adv.



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
