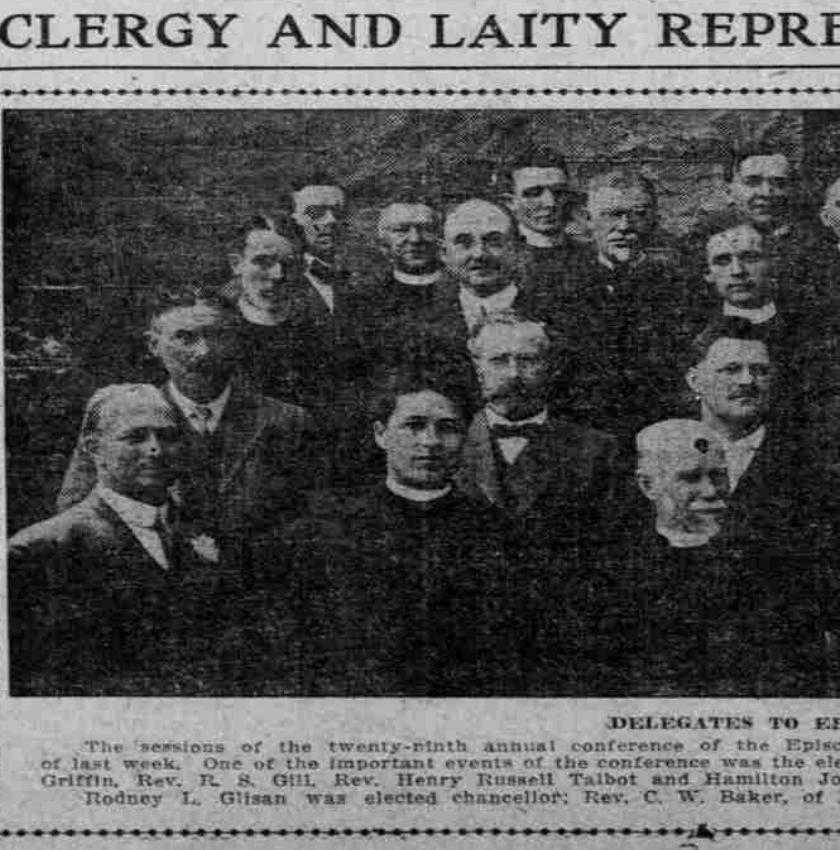
MILWAUKIE, Ore., May 23.—(Special).—The City Hall was filled to its capacity last night for the graduation of the first class of forty students from the high school.

Accused Agent Testifies That E. C. Herlow Attended to Finances of Realty Company Which They Operated Jointly.

Details of the finances of the Chapin-Herlow Mortgage & Trust Company were gone into yesterday by Deputy District Attorney Collier in his cross-examination of W. H. Chapin, on trial charged with larceny, as a bailee, of \$3500 from Mr. and Mrs. William Grace.

Though he was president of the company and looked at the books with more or less frequency, Mr. Chapin testified that he had no intimate knowledge of the finances of the company. This was attested to solely by his partner, E. C. Herlow, Mr. Chapin said.

DEVELOP POWER, IS PLEA OPENING OF VAST RESOURCES ALONG SNAKE RIVER URGED. Dam 200 Feet High Would Create 200,000-Horsepower and Make Waters Navigable, Says J. H. Lewis.

That the people are overlooking a great development project along the Snake River is the opinion of State Engineer John H. Lewis, who returned to Portland yesterday from an inspection of the district between Oregon and Idaho.

It is this enormous fall in the river through a narrow rock-walled canyon, bordered with extensive forest, mining and other resources, which gives hope that in the near future cheap slack water barge transportation may be had from the Upper Snake River valley to tidewater at Portland.
