

CLAUDE WILLIAMS BLANKS PORTLAND Southpaw Evans Loses Game Early and Then Beavers' Interest Wanes.

VICTORY WOLVES' FOURTH Rieger Goes In to Rescue but Is Met With Single That Scores Young and Martonni Is Called On to End Engagement.

SACRAMENTO, June 20.—(Special.)—For 13 weeks Sacramento fandom has entertained the opinion that Sailor Strout was the only Sacramento pitcher who could twirl a shut-out game. Today Claude Williams, Southern Association southpaw, acquired via the Detroit route, achieved the distinction of pitching the first shut-out game for Sacramento this year in which Strout did not figure. Thanks to the inefficiency of southpaw Evans, the Portland Beavers drew 5-to-0 eighth game series.

The game was won and lost in the second inning, and the Twirler Evans has nobody but himself to blame. With one gone, Van Buren and Moran saw "beat out" Rogers' hits when Evans knocked down drives, fattening to look them himself and knocking them just far enough so that Shortstop Bancroft could not field them. That Evans caught Moran off first and both runners advanced.

Evans issued a walk to Hallinan, filling the bases. Hannah bounced a wicked drive off Bancroft's toes for a single, scoring Van Buren and Moran. Evans looked around, saw second base unoccupied, so walked Williams in order to have the sacks loaded again. Young rapped one at Bancroft who tossed to Rodgers, forcing Williams. Rodgers threw wide to first in the attempt for a double play, Young malingering second, Hannah malingering third, and Hallinan scoring.

COAST LEAGUE WILL FIGHT

Baum Says Other Minors Must Not Be Allowed Precedence. SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 20.—President Allan T. Baum, of the Pacific Coast League, in speaking of the reported plan to organize a third major league, the League issued the following statement today:

I know nothing officially of the plans for the formation of a third major league, but in regard to what I have read from the press dispatches I can say this for the Pacific Coast League: We will fight to the finish for our rights, the National commission or any other body notwithstanding. The Pacific Coast League went back from its outlay career into the ranks of organized baseball in 1907 it was with the definite understanding with the National commission that no other minor league would ever be given a higher classification than the Coast League. That is the promise that was made to us at that time. If the rate of present plans be correct, that is the promise that the National commission now proposes to violate by raising the rating of clubs from the International League and American Association without giving the Coast League similar recognition.
