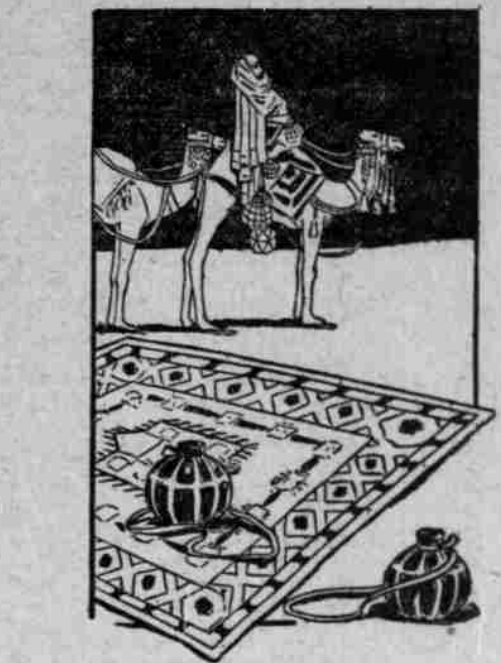
After a wedding reception in the afternoon, Mr. and Mrs. Graham left for a honeymoon journey to Portland. They will make their home at Mosier.

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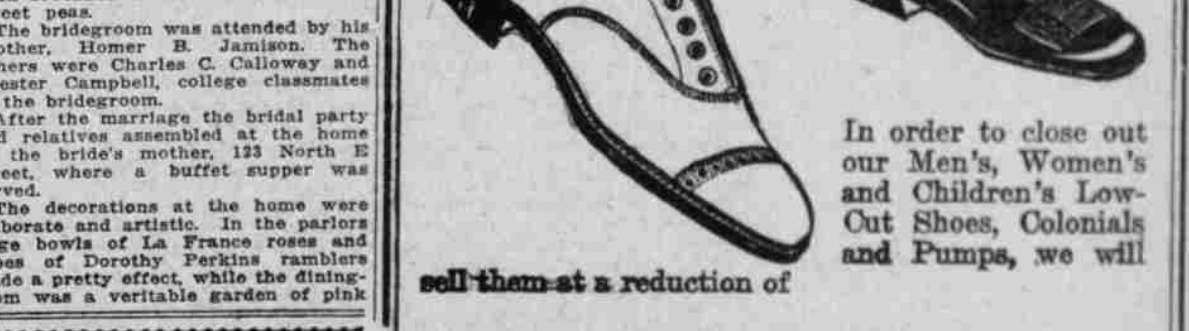
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
