DRY NATION IS AIM

Presbyterians of Oregon Will Conclude Sessions Today. NEW BUILDINGS PROPOSED. Congregations Behind in Obligations to Loaning Board Urged to "Square Up" So That Credit of Coast Will Be of Best.

EUGENE, Or., July 11.—(Special.)—All efforts of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church to wage a fight for prohibition in Oregon next fall, if centered in the Northwest, will be embodied in two sets of resolutions adopted by the synod of the Presbyterian Church of Oregon today.

During the past year Oregon Presbyterian churches have obtained \$25,000 in loans and \$2500 in grants. Among the churches aided were the Piedmont Church, in Portland, which obtained \$12,000, the first loan made from the Kennedy fund, and the Rose City Park Church \$7000.

Among the new important churches completed during the year have been the Gregory Heights Church, in Portland, costing \$160,000. Among the new churches now contemplated are the Hope Church, at Montavilla; a church at Bend, and the Spokane Avenue Church, in Portland.

At today's meeting it was reported that \$25,000 has been granted to churches in Oregon by the National Board of Home Missions for aid in paying pastors' salaries.
