## FISHING LAW FACES TEST Legality of Statute at Issue in Case Brought at Astoria.

ASTORIA, Or., July 11 .- (Special.)-A case that will test the constitutionality of one section of the state fishing laws of the state was started in Justice Court this afternoon. A sanitary sugar bowl—something that health authorities long have been demanding—has been invented by a Portland man, Dr. A. G. Bettman. It consists of a tube-shaped versel, closed at both ends, with a conical spout at the top through which the sugar is emitted. The sugar is released by inverting the bowl. An interior tube and a screw attachment regulate the quantity of sugar that can be extracted at one time. A lesser portion can be taken merely by replacing the vessel to an upright position.
