Portland Has No Better Than an Even Break, Says "Boss of Beavers."

SAN FRANCISCO. July 25.—(Special.)—A four-time pennant winner and therefore not to be despised as a prognosticator, Walter McCredie, boss of the Portland Beavers, declares the race of 1914 is a tossup with at least three teams, and four likely to be taken into consideration.

1914 Beavers Are Best. It is significant, perhaps, that Mc-Credie makes no bones of his view that the Beavers are a vastly improved club over 1913. Here is what he says:

"The Portland team is a better bal-anced club than last year. I know we lost Rip Hagerman and James, two great pitchers, but in other ways we have gained. We have, by long odds. have gained. We have, by long odds, the best infield in Coast League circles I wouldn't trade any one of that infield for any man the other clubs have. Our outfield is hitting well and the catching department is strengthened. The pitchers are not so streaky as carlier in the year and that is what counts."
