National League Batsmen Led
by Ross Erwin.

BROOKLYN SETTING PACE

James, of Braves, With 20 Victories
and Only 6 Defeats to His Credit
Puts Self at Head of Pitchers'
Column—Matty Is Third.

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—Only nine batters in the National League are in the .300 class, according to averages published here today.

Ross Erwin, with an average of .348 acquired in 20 games with Brooklyn, is leading. Next are Dalton, Brooklyn, .331; Becker, Philadelphia, .317; Daubert, Brooklyn, .317; Gonzales, Cincinnati, .314; Grant, New York, .313; Magee, Philadelphia, .310; Connolly, Boston, .306; Thelander, Chicago, .304; Wheat, Brooklyn, .303.

With three men among the leaders Brooklyn is setting the pace for the clubs with .350 and New York is next with .351. James, Boston, with 20 wins and six defeats; Rudolph, Boston, with 19 and 8; and Mathewson, New York, 21 and 10, lead the pitchers. However, Cincinnati has most stolen bases, 41.

In the American League Joe Jackson, Cleveland, has retained the leadership with .352. There are only 11 .300 hitters in the American and next to Jackson are Collins, Philadelphia, .344; Hobbitt, Boston, .341; Cobb, Detroit, .331; Mitchell, Washington, .326; Thelander, Chicago, .324; Speaker, Boston, .323; Baker, Philadelphia, .322; Crawford, Detroit, .321; McInnis, Philadelphia, .310; Walker, St. Louis, .308.

Philadelphia with 371 and Detroit with 351 lead the clubs, while Maise, New York, is leading base stealers with 52. Leading pitchers are Bender, Philadelphia, 14 and 3; Leonard, Boston, 19 and 5; and Plank, Philadelphia 16 and 4. Bennie Kauff, the Federal League's "Ty Cobb," continues to lead the outlaws with 267. Indianapolis leads in team hitting with .256 and Baltimore is next with .273. Kauff also leads in stolen bases with 57. Leading catchers are Ford, Boston, 15 and 8; Hendrix, Chicago, 21 and 9; and Kauterling, Indianapolis, 14 and 6.
