LAD OF 16 IN SEAFIGHT

NEPHEW OF F. H. V. ANDREWS WRITES OF BATTLE. Son of Mrs. Alice Andrews Holmes, Midshipman in His Majesty's Service, Handles 6-inch Gun.

The 16-year-old son of a former Portland resident now a midshipman in the service of his majesty, King George, aboard the H. M. S. Tiger which recently engaged with others of the British fleet several German submarines and warships in the North Sea has been in his first sea battle.
