LENTZ ALSO NEAR RECORD

Big Crowd Thrilled at Races at Which Contests Are Close and Time Fast—Romano Racer Does Mile in 51 Seconds.

What is said to be a new 10-mile record for the West on a one-mile circular dirt track was established at Rose City Speedway yesterday by Charles Latta, of Seattle, who he sent the eight-cylinder Romano racer over the final lap in 51 seconds after the start of the race. This same car, with Ray Latta at the wheel, won the 25-mile free-for-all event in 22 minutes 54 seconds and made the fastest mile against the clock in the flying start event by negotiating the distance in 52 seconds.

The announcement was made at the track yesterday that the Romano's run in the ten-mile event was a world record for a dirt track, but the officials were in error. The record for 10 miles on a dirt track was established by Louis Diebrow with his Simplex on September 14, 1912, at Cleveland, O. That time, 31:20, has never been bettered.

Seattle Car Is Victor. Another Seattle car, a Vette, driven by Fred Baragy, won the 10-mile Oregon versus Washington event for class B cars in 10 minutes and 15 seconds, and 10-mile race for class C cars in 10 minutes and 13 seconds.

Only three cars entered the Portland special event, Fred Baraby's Buick, Billy Smith's Marmon, and Harry D. Bankhead's Pope Special. Forbie, chief mechanic in the local plant of the Evans Company, who got his car in shape by working on it nights during the past fortnight, took the cake with a speed of 16 minutes and 25 seconds for the 10-mile race. Bill Smith gave Forbie a stiff chase with his Marmon. The Pope Special had had luck in the fourth lap and had to drop out for one trip over the road, lost a tire in the tenth lap and quit the race.
