

FEDERAL SCIENTIST HERE

Advice Given on Preventing Spread

of Rables by Coyotes.

Dr. A. K. Fisher, of the Biological Survey of the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture, arrived in Port-Survey land yesterday for a conference with the State Fish and Game Commission relative to Government co-operation in the destruction of predatory animals in Oregon. Congress appropriated sev-eral hundred thousand dollars for car. rying on this work throughout the United States and Dr. Fisher is in charge of that branch of the Biological Survey's activities.

Dr. Fisher plans to place particular emphasis upon the destruction of emphasis upon the destruction of wolves, coyotes and cougars in this state. He also conferred with Dr. Cal-vin S. White, State Health Officer, yes-terday relative to putting a stop to the spread of rables in the eastern and southern parts of the state, where it is communicated by the coyotes.
