Ex-Champion Avers Briton's Poor Showing Is Because He Takes No Chances.

## DRAWING POWER IS FADING

Second and Third-Raters Able to Appear to Advantage Against Englishman Because He Only Avoids Knockout Blows.

BY HARRY B. SMITH. SAN FRANCISCO, June 19 .- (Special.)—The real inwardness of the sorry showing made by Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion of the world, has been revealed by Willie Ritchie. The San Francisco boy, who is still lightweight champion of America, reached home this week, and, while he didn't have a whole lot to say, what he did remark was quite sufficient to give us a line on the champion.

"Has Welsh gone back?" was the direct question that was thrust at him.
"I don't know that I can answer that question," said Ritchie, in a hesitating

manner.
"I can say this, however," be continued. "I never saw a fellow who had evidently made up his mind to take as few chances as Freddie Welsh. Judging from our own bout, he went into that match as he goes into others, with his mind made up to stay the limit and not be knocked out. It seems to be an obsession with him—this determination not to let any one knock him out. He doesn't go in with the idea of winning, but merely to stay the limit, for Welsh is shrewd enough to realize that he can't lost his title in a decisionless bout. I've heard of other champions who have pursued the same tactics, but Welsh goes the limit."

If Welsh simply will not fight, a lot of the points are going to be scored against him. 
