Great Celebration of Independence to Be Marked by Demonstration in Multnomah Field Tomorrow.

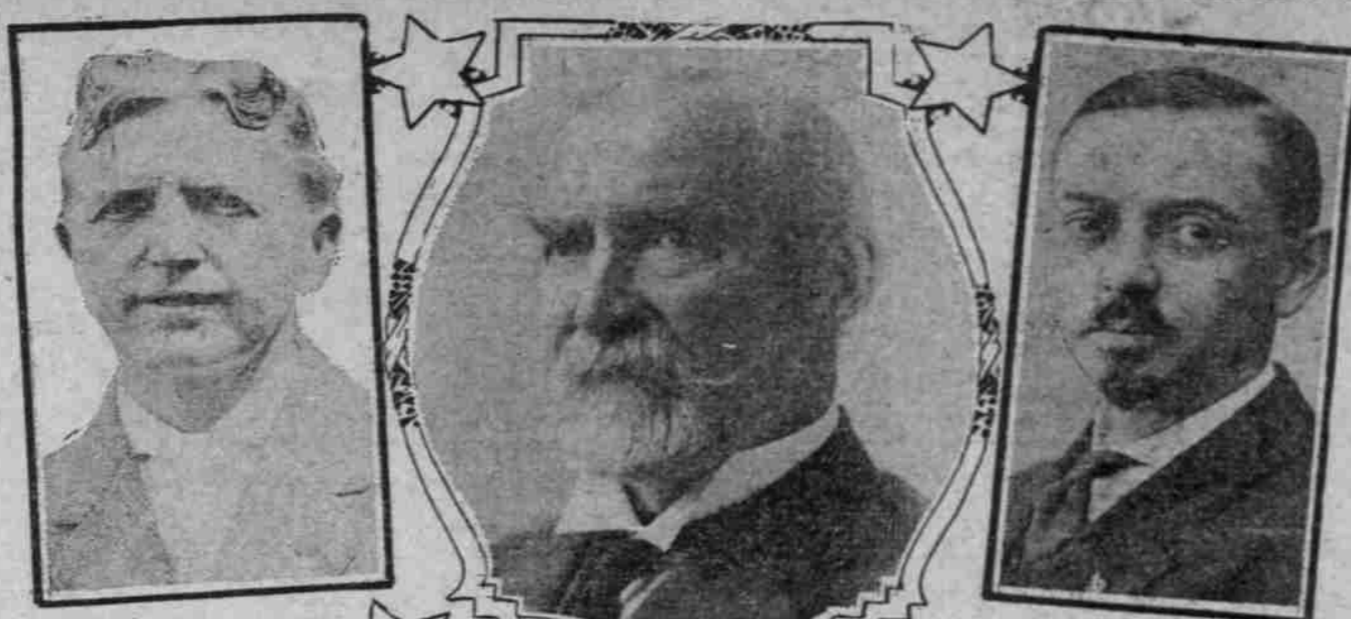

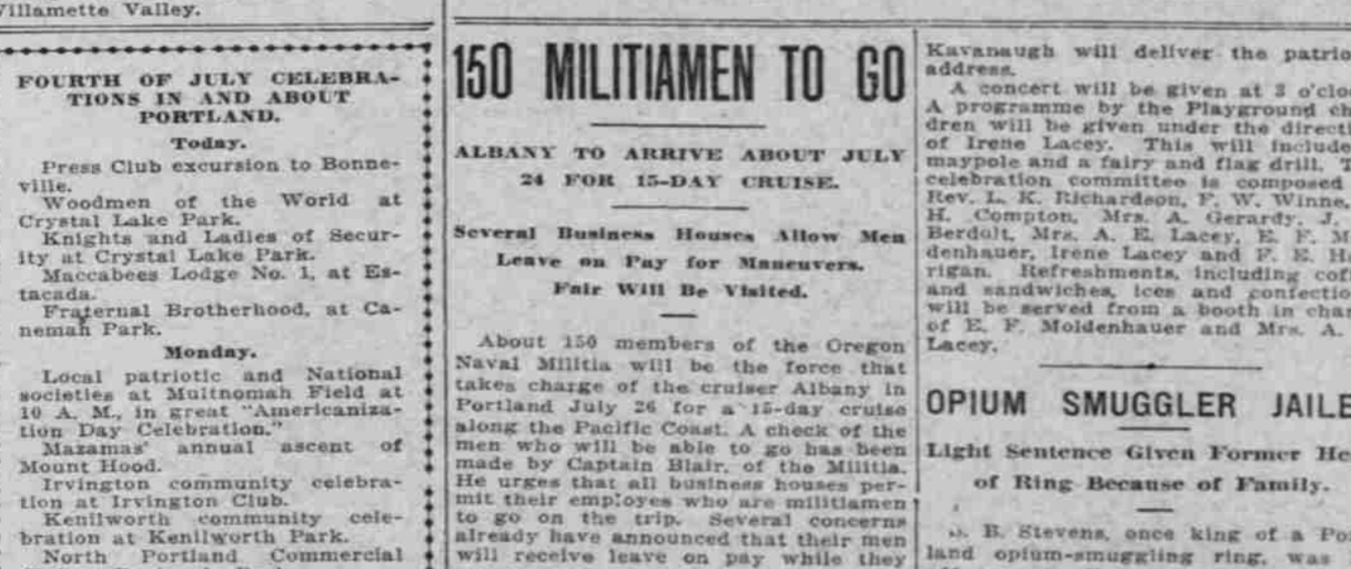

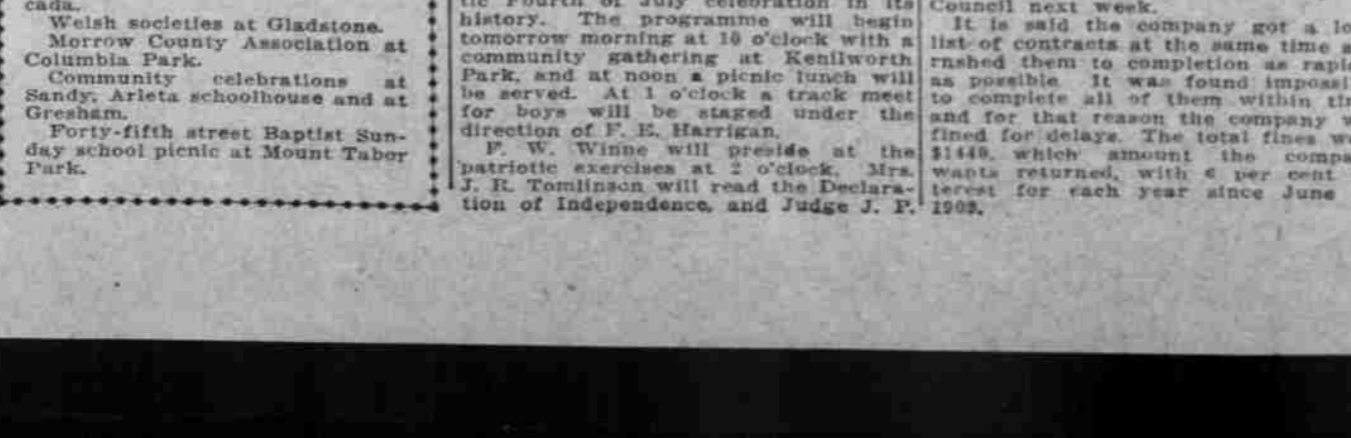

Fourth of July celebrations of one form or another have taken place practically every year in the "Oregon country" for the last 174 years.

1841-Sunday, July 4-A fine day; celebration on 5th, Monday, under direction of Captain Robert Wilkes, United States Navy.

1842-Friday, July 4-Colonel B. F. Shaw, who came in 1841, said the day was fine and the celebration was appropriately celebrated at Champeau.
