Postal Job Tests Arranged.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that a clerk-examination will be held at Portland beginning on September 4, to establish an eligible register from which selection may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the positions of substitute clerk or substitute carrier at the Portland, Or., Postoffice. The age

limits are 18 to 45 years. The entrance salary for the positions of clerk and carrier, Post Office Service, is now \$500 a year, with annual promotions in first-class offices up to \$1100 a year for efficient service. Application blank and instructions to applicants may be obtained from the Portland secretary, Board of Civil Service Examiners, Postoffice building, Portland.

Mrs. McDowell Likely to Live.

Mrs. G. M. McDowell, wife of the agent for the W. H. Grace Steamship Company, who swallowed a tablet of bichloride of mercury Friday night, mistaking it for a headache capsule, was reported to be in good condition at St. Vincent's Hospital, and to have an excellent chance for recovery. She screamed as soon as she realized her mistake, and antidotes were immediately administered, so that her condition is not believed to be serious.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 3.—(Special.)—James McQuig, a resident of Lewis County for the last 33 years, died Wednesday night. Mr. McQuig was born in Ohio in 1851. He came to Lewis County when 21 years of age and settled on a farm at Ethel, where he lived the rest of his life. He is survived by his widow and four children.

MUSICIANS WILL STAY

DISPUTE WITH THEATRICAL MANAGERS IS ENDED.

Only Two Houses Announce Reduction in Number, Each Dropping One Man From Force of Six.

All difficulties between the Musicians' Union and the theatrical managers which have been pending for the last few weeks were amicably adjusted yesterday.

As a result the union men will remain in the theater orchestras, but the managers will retain the privilege of designating the number of men they want in their respective orchestras.

It is understood that two of the vaudeville houses will decrease their orchestras Monday from six men to five.

By advice of the Central Labor Council the Musicians' Union withdrew its demands recently made on the theater managers for a minimum-number-of-men agreement. The theater managers in turn recalled the two weeks' dismissal notices that would have gone into effect tonight.

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
