Billy Madden, called by some of the fathers of modern glove boxing, who picked up John L. Sullivan in Boston quite some years ago and made a world's champion of him, stopped in Portland yesterday a few hours between trains.

When Madden took hold of the burly Sullivan he had a hard time getting him into condition, as Sullivan was getting pretty much discouraged by his inability to break into the game. He had been turned down by two managers, and wouldn't believe Madden when he told him he would take him in tow. The subsequent rise of the big Irishman is well known.

This is Madden's first jaunt to the neck of the woods since he was here with Gus Ruthin about 10 years ago. He is on his way north from a visit to the big show in San Francisco.

He is now proprietor of a health resort in the California coast at Cairo, N. Y., and says he is devoting his time infusing new life into physical wrecks. He intends to deliver some lectures on health on his way back home.

Madden has taken a fancy to Eddie McGoorty, the Oshkosh middleweight, and says that he is showing a showing in some of his late matches, he thinks McGoorty is the class of the present-day middle and heavies.
