Roscoe Fawcett Thinks Dozen Coast Stars Are Fit for Duty With Majors.

THREE BEAVERS ON LIST

Harry Heilmann, of Seals, and Joe Geddon, of Salt Lake, Regarded as Certain to Be Taken, but Others Ranked First Class.

Although not more than six or eight Coast League stars will see up this fall to the majors, there are over a dozen entitled to the jump, in our humble judgment.

And here is the list:  
Portland—Third Baseman Bates, Outfielder Speas and possibly First Baseman Durrick.  
San Francisco—First Baseman Heilmann and Third Baseman Jones.  
Oakland—First Baseman Neas, Salt Lake City—Second Baseman Geddon and Pitcher Williams.  
Los Angeles—Shortstop Terry, Second Baseman McMillen and Pitchers Scoggins and Los Corbys southpaw.

Venice—Outfielder Wilhoit and Risberg and possibly Pitcher Piercey.  
Three of the above are already under big league option and will surely be recalled, to wit: Harry Heilmann, of the Seals, Joe Geddon, of Salt Lake and Wilhoit Jones, of the Seals.

Heilmann spent last year on the Detroit bench and will go back next Spring unless Hughie Jennings has something worse to say about his batting. Heilmann is one of the greatest, if not the greatest, hitters the Coast League has ever cultivated. He is on the same club with Ping Bodie and Ping is only a mild "presenter" performer alongside Heilmann. Heilmann is batting .336 and Bodie .236 and Heilmann has hit 12 homers to 7 for Ping.

**Geddon Belongs to Washington.**
