Again, if Congress should tinker with the original act, and provide that the lands shall be sold to actual settlers with the timber thereon reserved, who would get the timber and when? Speculators would get it, of course. And these speculators would not cut the timber until they got good and ready. Meantime what would the actual settler be doing in a wilderness that would not be his own? He could make no headway whatever. What a beautiful mess this bright and shining plan of the timber speculators would bring about.

But if the land and the timber be given to the settler, the latter will be able to market the ripe trees as they mature, and he will be able to husband the rest. He will have a little forest preserve all his own, which will bring him a yearly income, in addition to that derived from his orchard, garden and field.
