SIXTY years of happy married life were observed Saturday, July 24, by Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Mathena, at the home of their eldest daughter, Mrs. W. R. Stokes, 455 Prescott street. Mr. and Mrs. Mathena had contemplated passing the anniversary in a quiet way, but their children and grandchildren arranged a programme of festivity and sent them on an automobile ride early in the evening. When they returned they found the Stokes home invaded by a large gathering of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, numbering 35, and many friends of the family.

Rev. E. S. Bollinger had been called into service, and he officiated at a ceremony rehearsing the early marriage vows of Mr. and Mrs. Mathena. Following a supper the evening was passed with music, dancing and other diversions. One of the features of the supper was the huge wedding cake, which was prepared by the children. Emblazoned on it in icing were the words, "Father and Mother, 1855-1915." Mr. Mathena was born in Newport, Ky., in 1836, and Mrs. Mathena in Covington, Ky., in 1838. Mrs. Mathena was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Herod. Mr. Herod was a well-known member of the Lexington, Ky., delegation to the State Legislature, and was instrumental in making some of the early laws of that state.

Mr. Mathena has been a well-known insurance man for the last 26 years, having been superintendent of the Metropolitan Insurance Company in Louisville and at Paducah, Ky. He is the only living member of a family of 12 children, while Mrs. Mathena is the last of seven children.

Five of the children of Mr. and Mrs. Mathena are still living. They are: C. A. Mathena, Mrs. M. L. Stokes, J. W. Mathena, Mrs. E. L. Doencke and Mrs. M. M. Carson. They also have 19 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. Mr. and Mrs. Mathena have lived in Portland since 1890 and reside at 909 East Eighth street North.

TAXICAB INSPECTION PLAN

Mr. Daly Reports Many Failing in Jitney Tests Operating Now.

Commissioner Daly is considering the advisability of framing an amendment to the taxicab ordinance, requiring that all such vehicles be inspected by the city and passed before being permitted to operate. Mr. Daly said the need was shown when the inspection of jitneys was in progress. He said that a large number of the drivers, who failed to pass the examination, immediately began to operate their cars as taxicabs. Mr. Daly and City Attorney LaRoe are working on a jitney ordinance to submit to the Council to take the place of the one thrown out by the Supreme Court.

CITY NOT TO GET PARK

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TURN DOWN TRACT DONATION PLAN.

Old Farm Property to Be Retained and Sold at Opportune Time to Erect Hospital.

The dream of some golf enthusiasts and the hope of the City Council that the 200 acres on Canyon road, known as the old County Farm property, might be donated to the city for park purposes was shattered yesterday morning when the County Commissioners looked over the City Council's request for a deed to the property. The request was "laid on the table" by the Commissioners, and their attitude indicated that they had no intention of giving the old farm away.

"The city has lots of parks now, and some of them outside the city limits," said Commissioner Holbrook. "They have no money to improve them, and if we gave them the old farm they couldn't do anything with it for some time. Furthermore, the county needs the property. It seems to me that the county is better able to care for parks outside the city limits than the city is, especially inasmuch as the park fund of the city is low. We don't want to sell the land now, because we could hardly get a fair price for it. But we could use the proceeds from it eventually to build a new county hospital, which is badly needed."

When the City Council requested the farm as a gift it had been advocated that a public golf course be located there, and some enthusiasts had built up rather strong hopes in this direction.

The resolution asking for the park was passed by all the members of the Council, except Mr. Baker, who did not want it to appear that he was backing a project with the purpose of enhancing the value of his own land. Also he declared the property could not be improved by the city right away, and he would not object to the city owning it.
