CORNELIUS VETERAN DIES

George Edwin Mooberry, Aged 68, Is Buried by G. A. R.

CORNELIUS, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—George Edwin Mooberry died at his home at Cornelius, August 2, after a lingering illness. He was born in Tazewell County, Illinois, November 29, 1847, and enlisted in Company A of the 15th Illinois Infantry at the age of 17, and received an honorable discharge at the close of the war.

He was married to Mary Mallon at Farmdale, Ill., in 1874, and with her family moved to Oregon in 1889, coming to Cornelius, where he resided up to the time of his death. He is survived by his widow and four children—Mrs. D. U. Cochran, of Clackamas; Gilbert E. and Byron, of Kings Valley, and Lester, at Cornelius. The funeral was held at the Methodist Church Wednesday morning. Services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Irving. Interment took place in the Cornelius cemetery under the auspices of the G. A. R. E. Matthews Post, Grand Army of the Republic, of Forest Grove.

DANCING NUMBER INTERPOLATED INTO AMUSEMENT PARK BILL.

ARMY SAVING URGED

"Preparation Against War" Is Slogan of League.

SECURITY PLANS ARE LAID

Legislation Correcting Wasteful Methods of Military Appropriations Is Being Sought. Balanced Navy Advised.

"Preparation Against War" and not preparation for war, is the slogan adopted by the National Security League. The programme of the league, just formed, with headquarters at 31 Pine street, New York City, contains five provisions that it wishes to have championed by at least a million volunteer workers.

The definite points in the programme are legislation correcting the present wasteful methods of military appropriations and disbursements; the adoption of a definite military policy; a stronger, better-balanced Navy; an effective mobile regular Army; better Government support for the National Guard, and the creation of an organized reserve for each branch of military service.

Government officials and ex-Government officials throughout the entire country have become active in the work of the league and such men as Joseph H. Coates, ex-Ambassador to England; Judge Alton B. Parker, Henry L. Stimson and Benjamin F. Tracy occupy honorary positions on its governing board.

League Is Non-Political.
 The purpose of the organization of the league and the ideals it intends to live up to are best explained by a review of the league's programme. The executive secretary of the league, on National Defense day at Delaware River on July 28.

The review follows:
 "The league is a non-political, non-partisan, neutral organization. It was started by many of the most eminent men of New York City, who believed that it was necessary to awaken public sentiment to the real condition of our National defenses in order to secure from Congress the adoption of the plans for National defense submitted by the Army and Navy boards. The fact that such a sentiment existed is evidenced by the tremendous success which has crowned the efforts of the league."

"Thousands of patriotic American citizens have joined the league, and branches have been established in Boston, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Chicago and all the larger cities, with nearly 100 branches elsewhere. The crystallization of public sentiment into these branches is sure to have an effect upon Congress, and undoubtedly the activity of the league is largely responsible for the steps taken by the President to bring the matter of national defense to the attention of Congress."

Contributions Support Work.
 The league is supported by voluntary contributions, no money being received from any firm or corporation engaged in the manufacture of munitions of war. Literature sent out by the league, made up of extracts from official reports and testimony before Congressional committees, demonstrates the need of preparedness. Statements made covering the Delaware River today are applicable in more or less degree to the entire coast line of the United States, both on the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

"The time is past when Congress can be indifferent to these conditions. Congress must respond to the demand that this country shall insure itself on the side of 'peace' by being prepared against aggression, and this demand is being met by the National Security League. The work which is being done to secure adequate National defense is earnest, unselfish and patriotic. It is the support of every citizen concerned in the future welfare of this country."

STREET WORK BIDS OPEN.
 Council to Take Action on Improvement Offers Soon.

Bids were opened Thursday on several street improvement jobs which the Council will consider soon.

The Oregon Independent Paving company submitted the lowest bid for the improvement of Park street from College street to Hall street, the figures of that concern being \$1288.67.

In the bidding for the improvement of portions of East Twenty-seventh street and East Madison street as a district, the lowest bid, \$4733.26, was submitted by Hahn & Rehrman.

Lowest bids on other proposed improvements were: Star Sand Company, \$5224.57, for improving portions of Corbett street and Custer street as a district; J. C. Edmonds & Burge, \$1282.44, for improving Nineteenth street southeast to Woodstock avenue southeast.

For the improvement of East Twenty-seventh street from East Everett street to the south line of Logan's Addition figures were submitted on different brands of pavement. The lowest bid was that of the Oregon Independent Paving Company for asphaltic concrete at \$1.39 a yard, amounting to a total of \$2015.60.

Azar & Company bid \$1273.42 for supplying sewer pipe for East Fifty-eighth street from Sandy boulevard to Sacramento street.

IRISH PATRIOT HONORED

HIBERNIANS RECALL LIFE AND DEEDS OF DANIEL O'CONNELL.

Father O'Farrell Advises Neutrality and All Speakers Call for Support of President.

Portland's Hibernians paid highest tribute to the great Irish patriot, Daniel O'Connell, at their celebration of his anniversary Friday night at the new Hibernian Hall on Russell street and Rodney avenue. The hall was well filled.

Daniel O'Connell was born August 6, 1775, and died August 15, 1847, and the programme of the evening was devoted to a rehearsal of his life and accomplishments.

Father J. M. O'Farrell opened the entertainment with a talk on "The Irish and Loyalty," in which he said: "We should be neither pro-German nor pro-Irish in this war. The Irish have been loyal from the time of Washington down to the day when the boy patriot McGuire died on the Mexican border, and in any case they remain loyal to the United States."

Miss Sue Firth contributed two enjoyable vocal solos and Mrs. James H. McMenamin gave violin selections.

The principal speaker of the evening was Francis A. McMenamin, who discussed "Daniel O'Connell on Patriotism." In his speech Mr. McMenamin emphasized the point that "All should have but one aim and that to stand behind President Wilson and support the American emancipation bill is to the negro, and therefore was the greatest service of O'Connell to his country."

The committee for the affair was James C. Hayes, chairman; Dr. V. A. Fitzgerald, Dr. Leo McKenna, Frank Mallon, J. J. McGreal, James Fin and E. J. Murnane.

After the entertainment the rest of the evening was spent in dancing.

100 ACRES SOWN TO FLAX

Experiment on Wapato Lake Property Promises to Be Successful.

GASTON, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—An interesting experiment is being tried on the Wapato Lake property, owned by ex-Governor Moore, of Washington, and operated under the firm name of Gaston Gardens Company.

One hundred acres of flax have been seeded and the fiber promises to be long and of good quality. The manager is in Salem studying methods of harvesting fiber on the State Farm under the supervision of the flax expert there. The Gaston Gardens Company has about 800 acres of land under the plow that will be devoted to flax if this year's experiment proves successful.

CHINA PRINTER ON VISIT

Kelso Couple Entertain Son-in-Law From Oriental Republic.

KELSO, Wash., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—B. A. Roberts, a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hall, of Kelso, who has been located in Shanghai, China, with his wife for a number of years with the Adventist Mission Press there, has been a Kelso visitor the past few days.

He is now employed by the Commercial Press of Shanghai, China, which operates one of the largest commercial printing plants in the world. This concern prints practically all the school textbooks used in that country and has more than 1400 employees on its payroll, operating more than 75 presses.

Mr. Roberts, who is the only white employee of the company, has been sent to this country to buy the latest equipment and study the latest methods of printing.

Mr. Roberts is conversant with conditions both political and financial in China, and holds the opinion that Japan never will dominate the Chinese people. He says that the Chinese people, rich and poor, low and high, are

rapidly acquiring a national race consciousness and that they are standing squarely behind the new Chinese Republic, and that some day China will assert herself against Japan.
