

FEE'S RECORD IS THOUGHT WONDER

Oregon Athlete, Third Greatest All-Around Man in States, Is Pendleton Product.

VARIOUS HONORS ACQUIRED

Process Is Shown in High School Days but Conference Meets in Early College Years Hoodoo, Which Has Been Overcome.

BY EARL R. GOODWIN. Few followers of athletics in Oregon realize the great possibilities of Chester A. Fee, the University of Oregon athlete.

When he won the honor of being the third greatest all-around athlete in the United States at the annual Amateur Athletic Union games in San Francisco the first part of this month, while representing the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club of Portland, right then began the desire to become the greatest in the country.

As an all-around athlete his record during his last couple of years in high school and his first three in college proves that he has been his own with any of the college boys. During the decathlon competition in San Francisco Fee established two records which will stand for some time. He went 12 feet in the pole vault and threw the javelin 156 feet 8 inches.

Second Place Within Grasp. A total of 442.81 points were credited to the Pendleton boy as a result of his work at college. He has been able to do better in each event except the pole vault. He ran 100 meters in 12.4 seconds and covered a mile in 13.2 seconds. Five feet 2 inches was his best high jump and in his next event, the javelin, he threw the spear 156 feet 8 inches.

His hardest contest was the 1500 meters, but he managed to negotiate the distance in 5 minutes 20.5 seconds. The discus was thrown 99 feet 10 inches, and the shot was made at 35 feet. In the high hurdles he went the 118 meters in 16.1 seconds. He has done 13.3 in the high sticks.

To the University of Oregon, goes a great deal of credit of making Fee what he is today in an athletic way. The first year at college Coach managed to be the high point winner in every dual meet he was in, but when he went to Whitman to the conference meet he "weakened," and the best he could get was third in the pole vault.

Conference Showings Poor. In 1914 he registered seven points against the University of Washington and 11 against Oregon Agricultural College, but failed to make any kind of a showing in the conference. In the season just ended he scored 14 points against the Multnomah Club, 18 against the University of Washington, 13 in the conference meet at Corvallis and 17 in the annual Pacific Northwest Association track and field championships held on Multnomah Field during the Rose Festival week.

The mark of 13 points in the conference is said to be the largest number ever scored by one athlete in a conference meet. He was second in the high hurdles, javelin, high jump, pole vault, and third in the broad jump. He was first in the javelin, second in the high hurdles, broad jump, pole vault and shotput.

While in high school he made quite a name for himself in his "own home town" and the neighborhood around Pendleton. He began his athletic career while a sophomore, but all he did was to "plug" along. The next season, however, he went with the Pendleton High School boys to the interscholastic meet at Walla Walla and there he scored eight points out of his team's 26. He was high point winner of the day and was largely responsible for the title being brought to the Oregon school.

Athletic Honors Won. His greatest feat, outside of the present campaign, was performed in a county meet at Albion, Or. late in the afternoon he brought home 28 points to his school. He defeated all comers in the pole vault, high jump, high hurdles, shotput and low hurdles he finished second. He got third place in the hammer throw and discus.

In all, he has won besides ribbons and other emblems. He is the son of James A. Fee, former Circuit Judge and is Eastern Oregon's leading lawyer in his spare moments writes coe.
