

DR. HILL WILL FIGHT SUIT TO BITTER END

Pastor's Lawyer Says Only
Menace Is That Woman
Is Still Willing to Wed.

INVESTMENTS ARE DENIED

Miss Covington's Lawyer Files Ac-
tion for Breach of Promise, De-
pite Fact She Is Said to
Have Repudiated It.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Dr. John Wes-
ley Hill, former pastor of the Metro-
politan Temple and now president of
the International Peace Forum, will
fight Miss Lucille Covington's \$100,000
breach of promise suit to the bitter
end. He said so today, and his lawyer
characterized the young woman's com-
plaint in the suit as "illiterate, puerile"
and other things.

Meanwhile the air of mystery about
the case was deepened by the action of
Miss Covington's lawyer in filing the
suit after Miss Covington, at Alpena,
Mich., had denied that she had sued the
clergyman. When Nathan F. Smith, her
attorney, read the denial of his client
he lost no time in getting his complaint
on record. At the same time he sent
Miss Covington a long telegram, as she
had placed him in a most embarrassing
position. He asked her if she had been
quoted correctly.

Clergyman's Attorney Emphatic.
Bainbridge Colby, Dr. Hill's attorney,
called the complaint "illiterate, puerile,
absurd and unconvincing." He referred
to the suit as a "wretched thing" and
a "scandalous joke, bungling, tottering
and clumsy." He then dictated this
more moderate statement:

"I have received a copy of the com-
plaint. It is a very queer little docu-
ment, containing no assertions except
the barest allegation of a promise
made some five years ago and not
kept. The only menacing allegation is
that the plaintiff is 'ready and
willing to marry the defendant.'"

"It is clearly an insufficient state-
ment of a cause of action and, ac-
cording to the plaintiff's own state-
ment, has already been repudiated by the
plaintiff."

"It looks as if the matter had now
narrowed down to a breach of prom-
ise action by Mr. Schmidt. At any rate
the controversy is between Mr. Schmidt
and his client."

Investments Are Denied.

"The intimation from the plaintiff
that Dr. Hill owes her an accounting is
without any foundation. He never re-
ceived a dollar from her to invest. From
information I have received I question
whether Miss Covington was ever ex-
tensively concerned in investments."

Mr. Colby said Dr. Hill was not
wealthy, but would fight the suit to
the last ditch.

"But I don't think it will get very
far," added the lawyer.

When Dr. Hill himself read a copy of
the complaint he reiterated his denials
of the night before. He said:

"There is not a scintilla of syllable
of truth in any of the charges," he said
at his home. "I agree with the state-
ment Miss Covington made last night
that the thing is ludicrous."

Klickitat Fair Closes

SEVENTH ANNUAL EVENT PROVES
SUCCESSFUL IN EXHIBITS.

Demonstration That Soudan Grass Can
Be Raised Makes Farmers Happy
From Crop Viewpoint.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Spe-
cial).—The seventh annual Klickitat
County Fair ended today while the
attendance was considerably under that
of the last year the fair directors an-
nounced tonight that they expected to
break even on the financial end. From
an agricultural standpoint the present
fair is considered the most successful
one that has ever been held here. The
exhibits of Soudan grass, planted in
Klickitat this year for the first time,
demonstrated it can be raised success-
fully and will provide a forage crop
that long has been sought for land that
is unfit for wheat or other crops.

Most interest also was shown in the
improved breeds of livestock exhibited
this year. The Lyle district exhibit in
charge of Mr. Lyle, of the Lyle district,
1. B. Hewitt was awarded first prize
and contained 122 varieties of fruit and
vegetables, 32 different kinds of grains
and grasses. The general arrangement
and quality of the exhibit excelled any-
thing ever shown here.

The exhibit of vegetables grown by
J. E. Buchanan, on the Maryland ranch
at Maryhill, was awarded first prize
for the best display of vegetables.
J. J. Brown, of Goldendale, first
awarded the first prize for the best
individual display of farm products, and
William Olson, of the second.

The exhibit of Muscat and Tokay
grapes and guineas made by W. T.
Jordan, of Maryhill, cannot be excelled
outside of California.

LAW INTERESTS CANADA

Commissioners Are in Portland to
Study Workmen's Act.

J. H. McVey, F. Allbut, David Rob-
ertson and A. V. Pines, from Victoria,
B. C., are in Oregon as representatives
of the Canadian government studying
the workings of the workmen's com-
pensation act and securing data for a
report to be delivered to the Canadian
Parliament early in December. They
visited the State Commission in Salem
on Friday and yesterday forenoon was
consumed in conferences with repre-
sentatives of various organizations at
the headquarters of the visiting com-
mission at the Multnomah Hotel.

Representatives of the labor unions,
employers and officials who have had
to do with the administration of the
law, are being conferred with, and the
commission is endeavoring to get a
complete discussion of the act and the
merits of the Oregon act. Before com-
ing to this state they conducted a simi-
lar investigation in Washington.

Monroe Schools Enroll 120.
MONROE, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special).—
Monroe schools, which opened last
week, now have an enrollment of 120,
with more coming in, and a prospect
of being filled to capacity. There are
five teachers, with A. K. Miley as
principal. An equipment of physical
apparatus and text books, costing more
than \$200, has been purchased, which
will place the school on a basis of a
four-year standard high school.

MOTOR GAIN SHOWN

Oregon Registrations Total
26,126 Vehicles.

INCREASE IS REMARKABLE

Number of Automobiles and Motor-
cycles in State Is Far Ahead
of Last Year and Grows
Larger Each Month.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special).—Oregon
has 26,126 motor-driven vehicles,
according to figures compiled today
in the office of Secretary of State Ol-
cott, for the first nine months of 1915.
These figures include automobiles and
motorcycles, or a total of 25,895. The
state's army of chauffeurs also is rapidly
increasing, numbering 2804 at the
present time as compared with 1719
in 1914. There are 171 dealers regis-
tered in Oregon now, whereas last year
the total was but 109.

Some idea of the rapidity with which
automobiles have been purchased in
Oregon this year may be obtained
through scanning the registration fig-
ures for the different months of 1915.
The first three months of the year
show that there were approximately
16,000 automobiles listed with the Sec-
retary of State, equalling the total
number of machines in the state the
year before. The succeeding months,
therefore, would apparently indicate
that the number of new cars purchased.
April the automobile registrations
were 2269; May, 1482; June, 1410; July,
888; August, 969 and in September, 785.

Multnomah County Leads.
Multnomah County, with 5322 automo-
biles of all kinds, and 1748 motorcycles,
leads all other counties in Oregon,
while Marion follows with 1628 auto-
mobiles and 231 motorcycles. Multnomah
County is in third place in the number
of automobiles registered, having 1265,
and Jackson County stands fourth
with 1119 machines. Lincoln County
has fewer automobiles than any other
of the 36 counties, with but 25. It also
is the only county having no motor-
cycles.

Of the 171 dealers scattered through-
out the state, Multnomah County 1915
the most, the total being 46. Marion
County has 21 dealers. Multnomah County
has nine dealers and is third on the list.

cycle, chauffeur and motor vehicle
dealer registrations in the several

LUMBER TRACK IS LAID

East Oregon Company Starts Using
120,000,000 Feet Purchased.

Word has been received at the local
office of the District Forester that the
East Oregon Lumber Company has com-
pleted the 15 miles of new track from
Enterprise to the Wallowa National
Forest and that the company is begin-
ning to use the timber purchased from
the Government a number of weeks
ago. The total amount of lumber
bought from the Wallowa forest by
the lumber company was 120,000,000
feet.

The capacity of the new mill has not
been ascertained, but the officials of
the forest's office yesterday said it
would approximate 30,000,000 feet a
year.

Most of the timber purchased is pine.
