

BAPTISTS OF OREGON TO CONVENE AT EUGENE TOMORROW

Prominent Speakers Will Address State Gathering and Large Delegation From Portland Will Attend—Dr. W. B. Hinson Will Deliver Two Sermons or Lectures Daily.

All is in readiness for the state convention of the Baptists of Oregon, which will open in Eugene tomorrow. A large delegation from Portland will attend. The Baptist Church in Oregon was organized in 1844 and now has a large membership. Dr. W. B. Hinson, pastor of the White Temple, will be one of the principal speakers. He will deliver two sermons or addresses daily.

Other men of prominence in the denomination will give talks and papers and assist in making the convention one of the best ever held.

Rev. H. E. Marshall, of Salem; Rev. W. T. Miller, of Oregon City; Rev. W. O. Shank, Rev. W. E. Haysman, Rev. C. A. Woody and many others as well known will attend. Miss Ruby Weyburn and Miss Hazel Cooper, representing the missionary societies will have an important place on the programme. Jeff H. Irish is president of the convention and Rev. O. C. Wright will be executive secretary and superintendent.

This morning Dr. Hinson will preside at a most important missionary service, which will be held at the White Temple under Rev. D. E. Baker, will be heard.

At the evening service, which commences at 7:45, Dr. Hinson will preach his fourth sermon in the home series. The title of this sermon will be "How to Be Happy Through Faith." The sermons are to be printed in the Pacific Baptist, published by Dr. Clark at McMinnville, Or.

The fifth year of Dr. Hinson's pastorate of the White Temple was observed at the annual meeting last Thursday night. Reports from all the many activities of the church were heard, and they all indicated most remarkable success along all lines of work. Dr. Hinson's pastorate in Portland five and one-half years, having commenced his pastorate in May, 1910.

A party of Baptist foreign missionaries will be in Portland today. They include Rev. J. E. Werlein, wife and daughter, Miss Anna Linker and Rev. and Mrs. E. P. Manley.

Dr. Baker is the successor of Dr. Clough of the Industrial Mission School, Ongole, India. Rev. and Mrs. Manley being a graduate of McMinnville College. Both have been missionaries for 26 years.

This missionary party will occupy various Baptist pulpits in Portland today. Dr. Baker will preach at the White Temple Sunday morning and at the East Side Baptist Church tonight. Rev. Mr. Manley will speak at McMinnville in the morning and at the Highland Church in the morning and Grace Montavilla Church in the evening.

This party of missionaries leaves from Seattle on Tuesday on the Aki Maru in company with 14 other missionaries for India.

A Men's Community Club has been organized in the Piedmont Presbyterian Church and the members are looking forward to many interesting and helpful meetings. The first affair held was a chicken dinner served last Thursday by the women of the church. Dr. A. L. Werlein made the address.

The young people of the Methodist churches of the city are busy planning their winter's work. On Tuesday night representative members of the second department of the church met and the world evangelism met and drew up a constitution and elected officers: Walter Stearns, of Mount Tabor, president; May Rowland, of the Industrial; Alice Rarick, of Central Church, secretary-treasurer. The organization is to be known as Portland Epworth League and its purpose is to further the work of missions and the promotion of the missionary spirit among Methodist young people.

Tonight in Hope Presbyterian Church the H. Y. School League class will have charge of the service. J. E. Werlein will speak. Arthur Lynd, the converted opera singer, will sing. The class will also give a play. The class is composed of about 35 young men.

Rev. Dr. J. H. Houghton, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Denver, one of the foremost clergymen of the West, will preach on Sunday morning in St. Stephen's pro-Cathedral. A special invitation is extended to members and strangers to attend.

The meeting of the Portland Presbyterian Society on Wednesday at the Central Church was one of the interesting events of the week in the Presbyterian Church circles. H. H. Hinson, superintendent of the Sunday School, made a most optimistic report and acknowledged the help given by J. V. Guthrie, assistant superintendent, and the other officers and teachers. The school is showing in numbers and interest.

Frank Tomlinson, treasurer, and Miss M. Mascher, secretary, also reported. The reports of H. R. Kibbles, president of the Baptist Young People's Union, and J. M. Wooten, president of the Junior Baptist Young People's Union, told of the work covered by these organizations.

Miss Mary E. Beasley, the faithful and efficient teacher and missionary to the local Chinese, responded for that work. The report of the Women's Society was given by Mrs. H. H. Hinson and showed a large amount of work done.

The report of the committee on all work was presented by Miss Ada Martin. The church, through this committee, holds services at the county jail Wednesday nights.

The church treasurer, read his annual report and was given a rising vote of thanks. Mr. Phegley has been treasurer for 15 consecutive years. F. C. Knapp, chairman of the finance committee, also reported.

Miller Bible Class Leads in First Methodist Church.

With Increased Membership, Much Work is Mapped Out to Aid Congregation.

FROM the standpoint of efficiency, the Miller Bible class, of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, is one of the leaders among the various classes of the First Church Sunday school. From the time it was organized two years ago, up to the present, it has taken a commanding part in the affairs of the church and is known for its ability to do things, for it never starts anything it is not fully able to finish.

The Miller Bible class was organized November 8, 1913, with six members. Last April it had 109 active members. It has an associate membership of some 60. These, for various reasons, are not able to attend Sunday school with any degree of regularity, but assist in all functions of the class insofar as they are able.

With the organization of the class, E. S. Miller, for whom the class is named, was elected president and teacher. C. W. Henderson was named vice-president and assistant teacher and L. B. Baketel became secretary and treasurer. With the coming of the first annual meeting, the class was elected, and last Monday night, when the business meeting and social of the class was held in First Church, the members again honored them with a unanimous re-election for their third consecutive terms.

Being the largest single class in First Church and occupying the position it does, the Miller Bible class has set out for itself the goal of a deal of work which should go a long way toward assisting in the financial and other affairs of the church.

With the opening of the magnificent Sunday school temple the coming month this class will have the large room in the southwest corner of the upper floor adjoining the pastor's office for its class and social purposes. The class will furnish it and an immense fireplace will add to the homelike atmosphere. In this room all its work will be done.

During the last year the class has contributed, in various ways, upwards of \$100 to the poor and needy and has made itself felt as a factor for good in the church and the upbuilding of its work.

Its success is due to the united efforts of all the members. It has not only its growth and expects before long to have enrolled 200 couples of young married people.

The women's Mission Circle held a musical and dramatic evening, given by a trio of the faculty from the Irvington school, with Miss Ethel Elliott, piano; David N. West, violin; and Charles D. Raff, violinello. Mr. Nelson played a violin solo and Miss Elliott sang. The programme was an excellent one and was well received by the audience.

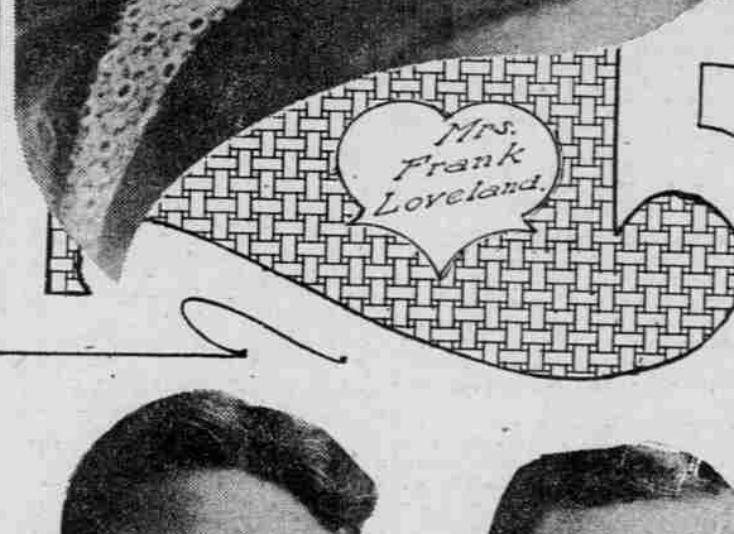

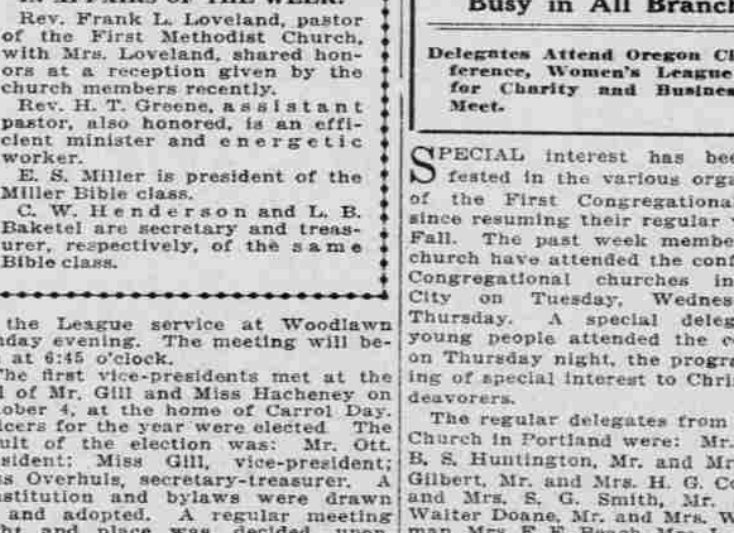

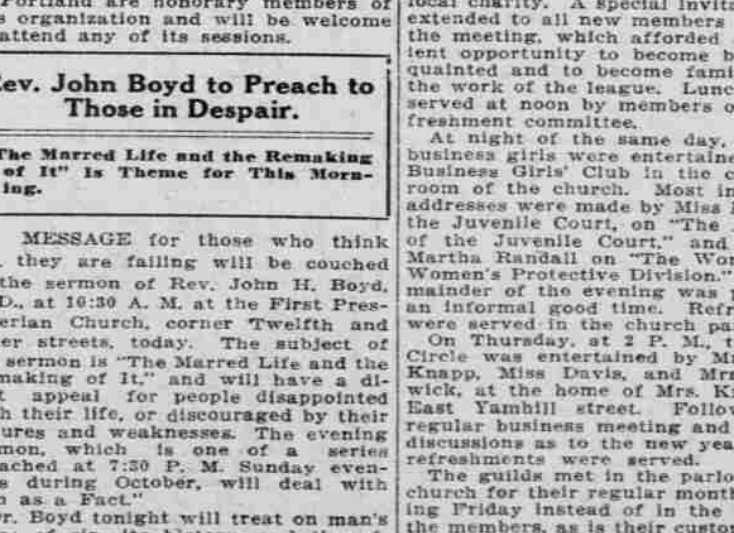
