

CALLS FOR PARTY COMRADES OUT

Democratic Policies and Broken Pledges Attacked by Republicans.

CANDIDATES ARE ACTIVE

Positive Declaration Made That Mr. Taft Will Not Consider Another Nomination - Wilson Approves Democratic Dates.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Chairmen of both the Democratic and Republican National committees last night issued calls for meetings in Washington to select dates for the coming conventions.

The Democrats will meet on December 7 and the Republicans December 14. Republican Campaign Outlined.

In addition to issuing his call, Chairman Hillis, of the Republican National Committee, set forth the probable line of campaign to be followed by his party. It will include:

An attack on the Democratic tariff. Criticism of the Administration's handling of affairs in Europe and Mexico. Charges that Democracy has failed to keep its promise of an economical Administration, and has failed to keep its 1912 platform pledges, including the declaration in favor of a single term for the President.

Administration Measures Criticized. Attacks on the Administration's Government ship bill and other Administration measures.

Mr. Hillis declared that there was no lack of interest in the Presidential race. Active organizers, he said, are being fielded for Senators Burton, Weeks, Cummins, Borah, Smith and Sherman.

Others who have strong followings, he said, are Justice Hughes, Phil Root, Philander C. Knox, Charles Warren Fairbanks and Governor Brumback.

ORDUNA AFFAIR DISAVOWED

Torpedo Fired Without Warning, Contrary to Instructions Issued as Desired by United States, Says Note From Berlin.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—A memorandum from the German government explaining the unsuccessful attempt of a submarine to torpedo the Cunard liner Orduna was made public here Friday. It reveals that as early as July 9 last, more than a month before the attack on the Arabic, German commanders had instructions to sink "large passenger steamers" without warning.

The document also contains the statement that the same submarine that attacked the Orduna halted the American bark Normandie, and, although finding her carrying contraband, allowed her to proceed unmolested because there was no guarantee that she would be rescued if left to her fate in small boats.

American Desire Realized. This is regarded as significant in connection with the fact that the United States on the case of the William P. Frye, in which Germany was asked for assurances that if American vessels carrying contraband pending arbitration of treaty rights, the crews would not be subjected to the risk of small boats in the open sea.

The Orduna memorandum, dated in Berlin September 9, was given out with other correspondence supplementary to the report and indictment of the so-called White Book, issued yesterday by the State Department. Its text follows:

At about a quarter past seven on the morning of July 9 last a German submarine sighted a steamer from three to five miles away and a sailing vessel about a mile away. The steamer was proceeding without any flag or neutral markings and was taken for a merchant steamer by the commander of the submarine on account of the difficulty of observation, caused by the unfavorable weather.

Torpedo Fired First. The commander decided first to attack the steamer submerged and fired a torpedo at the vessel. The torpedo missed its mark.

"Hoping to catch the steamer above the water, the submarine rose and chased the steamer on the surface. The steamer did not stop when a shot of warning was fired and therefore several shells were fired at her which did not strike her, as the submarine was pitching about and the distance was great.

The submarine then proceeded to the sailing vessel, which proved to be the American bark Normandie, bound from Newport for Liverpool with a cargo of lumber. Although the cargo contained contraband, the sailing vessel was not fired at and therefore several shells were fired at her which did not strike her, as the submarine was pitching about and the distance was great.

In order to accommodate the large number of birds expected the old Marquette building at Fifth and Pine streets has been obtained by the association. This building, which is 100 by 200 feet, will give rooms space for the first floor sufficient to accommodate 1500 birds. Pet stock will be housed on the second floor.
