

BERLIN SAYS ALLIES WILL GET SALOON

London Has Report, However, That More Transports Are Expected Soon.

CONSTANTINOPLE GETS AID

Special Trains With Munitions Dispatched Through Thrace—Neither Serbians Nor Bulgarians Now Holding Uskup.

BERLIN, Oct. 30, by wireless to Tuckerton, N. J.—The Overseas News Agency tonight gave out the following: "A dispatch from Athens reports that the entente troops have begun to retire from Saloniki."

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Saloniki correspondent of Reuters' Telegram Company sends the following dispatch: "The concentration of the troops of the entente allies at various points with the object of relieving the pressure on the Serbians is proceeding."

More Transports Expected. "More transports are expected soon, and since the recent torpedoing of the British transport Marquette in the Gulf of Saloniki the precautions against submarines have been increased."

The large number of refugees from Serbia and the influx of strangers, together with many officers belonging to the allied armies and the Red Cross units, have tended considerably to increase rents and food prices, and there is a shortage of several necessities, especially flour.

ROME, via Paris, Oct. 30.—Reports received here from the Balkans say that special trains have been prepared for the Bulgarian railway transiting German troops through Thrace to Constantinople.

Arms Already on Way. A quantity of arms and ammunition has been dispatched already, it is said.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—According to official news, says a Havas dispatch from Saloniki, under date of October 28, "neither Serbians nor Bulgarians are at Uskup, where a civil guard is reported to be maintaining order."

"Skirmishes took place east of Tirrilli, according to a telegram from General Baidou, of the Bulgarian army. Bulgarian companies reconnoitered Kirvolak (on the railroad line south of Tirrilli) and disappeared immediately."

Repulse of Bulgars Reported. A Havas agency dispatch filed yesterday at Saloniki says that Bulgarians who advanced from Latio on Thursday morning and attacked Veles were repulsed with heavy losses.

Reports from Bucharest say that the demonstration there last Sunday in favor of the entente powers resulted in collisions between the police and the manifestants, it is to be followed by a similar affair tomorrow. A Bucharest dispatch says that the Bulgarian demonstration, which has been arranged by the Nationalists, "will be the last constitutional effort to induce the government to take part in the war."

RUSSIANS REPORTED ON WAY

Berlin Hears Large Forces Are Preparing to Invade Bulgaria.

COFENHAGEN, via London, Oct. 30.—Large contingents of Russian troops have set sail from the Black Sea ports of Odessa and Sebastopol for the Bulgarian coast, the Berlin Tagblatt says. The dispatch, telegraphed to the Tagblatt from Bucharest, says that the transports are being escorted by a strong squadron. The recent attack by Russian warships on the Bulgarian port of Varna, according to this account was made in preparation for an attempt to land troops.

STUDENT PROVES BURGLAR

Berkeley Police Arrest Leon L. Long, University Man.

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 30.—Leon L. Long, of Los Angeles, a sophomore student at the University of California, was arrested this morning. Police say he has confessed to six burglaries. He is believed to have committed numerous mysterious burglaries in the past nine months.

Long has been living at a local hotel and has met his friends in the social life of the university. He possessed a wide acquaintance and was popular.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—Mrs. J. N. Long, mother of Leon L. Long, arrested by the police at Berkeley in connection with a series of burglaries, said today she learned recently of his extravagant habits and his association with undesirable companions.

Long's stepfather is superintendent of the Pacific Electric Railway at Redondo Beach, near here.

AGED PIONEER IS DEAD

Thomas Keating, 91, Picturesque Baker County Citizen, Passes.

BAKER, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Thomas Keating, one of the best known pioneers in this part of the state, died today at his home near Keating, 18 miles from here, aged 91. "Uncle Tom" came to Old Auburn 50 years ago and a few years later moved to the ranch where he died. Keating postoffice was named after him.

WEEK'S ACCIDENTS ARE 186

Compensation Act Applies to 138 of Those Injured in State.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Reports to the State Industrial Accident

Commission for the week ending October 25 show there were 186 accidents to workmen in the seven days, two of which were fatal. Those killed were Carl Carlson, of Svenson, a logger, and Charles Robbins, of Gaston, railroad employe. Of the total number reported as injured, 138 were subject to the workmen's compensation act, 22 were from public utility corporations, 22 were from other firms and corporations which have rejected the act, and 22 were from firms and corporations which do not employ labor in hazardous occupations.

ROAD PROTEST IS FILED

IMPROVEMENT OF HILLSBORO-Forest Grove Route Opposed.

Beaverton People Declare Highway Is of Solid Rock and Readily Passable at All Times.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Protest against the State Highway Commission expending any portion of the state fund in the improvement of the road from Hillsboro to Forest Grove was received today from the Beaverton Board of Trade by Acting Governor Olcott. At a recent meeting of the State Highway Commission a delegation from Washington and Yamhill counties asked the Commission to assist in improving the road.

Calling attention to the fact that Multnomah County has just completed hard-surfacing the Canyon road to the Washington County line on its eastern border, the Beaverton Board of Trade asserts that the logical place to begin here is from Hillsboro to Forest Grove. Multnomah County has been conducting its work and continue operations westward.

HESPERIAN LINK MISSING

FRAGMENT OF TORPEDO NOT ACCOMPANIED BY AFFIDAVITS.

Navy Board Finds Metal Was Not From Mine, But No Protest Will Yet Be Made to Berlin.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Navy Department experts, it was announced today, had found that the fragment of metal which was taken up from the deck of the torpedoed steamer Hesperian was from a torpedo and not a mine.

Nevertheless, although the report will be forwarded to the Berlin Foreign Office as a matter of information, it will not be accompanied by any request on the part of the United States. A link is missing in the chain of evidence on which the Washington government could demand a statement that it was convinced that a torpedo sent the ship to the bottom.
