

The bushel crates of unpacked culls The bushel crates of unpacked culls arrived in New Orleans running with rot, and were sold at auc-tion to the peddlers for from 30 to 50 cents a box. Car No. 3852 sold for the gross price of \$357.70 and car No. 51355 brought \$376.95. Sales at these figures mean that the shippets in Wenatchee will have to pay out of pocket to the railroad companies for freight. The first two cars of the crated apples


The first two cars of the crated apples arrived in fair condition and brought \$1 a box as an average, but the third car of this grade of fruit to arrive was sold last Wednesday at an average price of 20 cents a box, which left the growers to pay more than \$200 in restrict.
