It also is declared in German newspapers that Albanian troops are trying to bur the other road of retreat by concentrating on the Serbian border.

Way Open to Invaders.

The Bulgarian successes at Katchanik Pass Tetovo and Babuna Pass have now been confirmed and the Kussovo platein, where the Serbians expected to make a last desperate resistance, is now apparently open to the invaders. The fail of Monastir has not been confirmed and, according to latest information, the Serbians are advancing themse to meet the Bulgarians, but, endangered as it is from three different quarters—Babuna Pass, Brod and Krusevo-there is slight possibility of lisholding out in case the Bulgarians make a real attempt to take it.
