

Working plans have been completed and actual construction is to start on Pertland's \$400,000 public auditorium within a few days after January 1, if not before the end of December. Such was the information given, yesterday by J. A. Pelihoux, of the architectural firm of Whitehouse & Foulthoux, representatives of the auditorium architects, J. H. Freediander and A. D. Sey-

mour, of New York. A pen drawing of the new building, the first official drawing to be prepared, was received in Portland yes-

terday from Freedlander & Seymur.
It shows just how the structure will jook when completed on the Market block hounded by Clay, Market, Seedad and Third streets. The drawing indi-cates that the structure will be one of the most affractive buildings of the kind in the United States.

The working plans are expected to be in Portland by December 1, or a few days thereafter, aid will be checked over immediately and given to contractors wishing to submit bids for the general contract.

Plana Bushed to Completion.

On July 1 Commissioner Baker took office. On July 22 he and Mr. Foilhoux had prepared the rough plans for the structure and got them adopted by the Council. Five days later these plans were placed in the hands of Mr. Freedlander in New York. And now, less than five months later, the plans are complete. This is said to be a speed record.

Normally the main auditorium will seat 1650 persons. Then there will be a large gallery with a seating capacity of 2140, maing a total seating capacity of 2160.
