

# CROWNED HEADS WILL BE INVITED

### Dedication of Columbia Highway Proposed as Rose Festival Feature.

## GREAT CEREMONIAL PLAN

E. J. Jaeger, Who Has Been Invested With Authority to Complete Arrangements Think Idea Best Ever Conceived Here.

If the plans of the directors of the 1916 Rose Festival materialize, the chief figures in National and state life will help dedicate the Columbia Highway "to the world" as part of the opening day's ceremonies of next year's festival. E. J. Jaeger, temporary publicity manager of the Rose Festival Association, presented the plan to the board of directors at the last meeting and the plan was adopted as being the best that had yet been conceived to make the festival start with a bang.

Not only will the President and Mrs. Wilson be sent invitations, but all the chief executives, heads of all European governments and representatives from both houses of Congress will be invited to participate in the dedication.

Mr. Jaeger thinks that the plan will be "one of the biggest things that has ever been done in connection with any Rose Festival," and he has the assurance from Emory Omstead, president of the 1915 board, that the scheme will give the much needed punch to the festival. Besides the officials of state and Nation that will be sent special invitations to join in making the opening day a world known event, numerous social organizations will be asked to join in the dedication. Mr. Jaeger says that the details of the scheme are being worked out, but he said yesterday that the dedication probably would be held either at Crown Point or at Multnomah Falls. Either place, he declared, would make a setting that would defy description.

It is estimated by Mr. Jaeger that at least 4000 machines will be on the highway on the day of the dedication and that between 15,000 and 20,000 persons will take part in the ceremony. After the dedicatory drive, the highway is to be decorated with moving picture operators on the scene in film the event. The procession after the ceremony, which is to proceed to Portland and where near the outskirts of the city is expected to be augmented by a delegation representing the official escort of the queen and her retinue and in this conspicuous manner the Rose Festival would be inaugurated.

Mr. Jaeger says that the scheme as far as he is concerned is the greatest ever since it has the possibility of being one of the biggest advertising schemes that has yet been conceived. For the state and particularly for the City of Portland, the association expects little difficulty in raising enough money to finance the plan.

It is part of the plan to have the highway decorated, either by the property owners along the road or by the Festival Association, for the entire length of 42 miles of paved road. "There will never be anything of the kind that can compare with our scheme," enthusiastically announced Mr. Jaeger. The details of Mr. Jaeger's scheme will be worked out by sub-committees that he will appoint. He has been given complete charge of the dedication scheme by the president of the 1916 Festival and in order to make the thing a complete success Mr. Jaeger says that the work of many committees will be needed.

The next meeting of the association will be held Tuesday night and at that time a publicity manager for the 1916 Festival probably will be chosen.

## 25 MILES OF MAINS LAID

Twenty-five miles of new water mains will be Portland's record for the year 1915, according to figures made public yesterday by Water Engineer Clarke. Of this total, 8.1 miles was 4-inch and 2-inch mains and the rest 6 inches or larger. The mileage for 1914 is not as great as for several years. In 1912 the total miles of 4 inches or larger was 42.9; in 1913, 42.3 and in 1914, 43.5.

# NOTED SINGER COMING TO HEILIG DECEMBER 20

Johanna Gadski, Dramatic Soprano, Who Was Called Before Curtains 50 Times by Excited Audience, Will Appear in Portland.

THE coming song recital at the Heilig Monday, December 20, by the great dramatic soprano, Johanna Gadski, promises to be one of the most important musical events of the year. 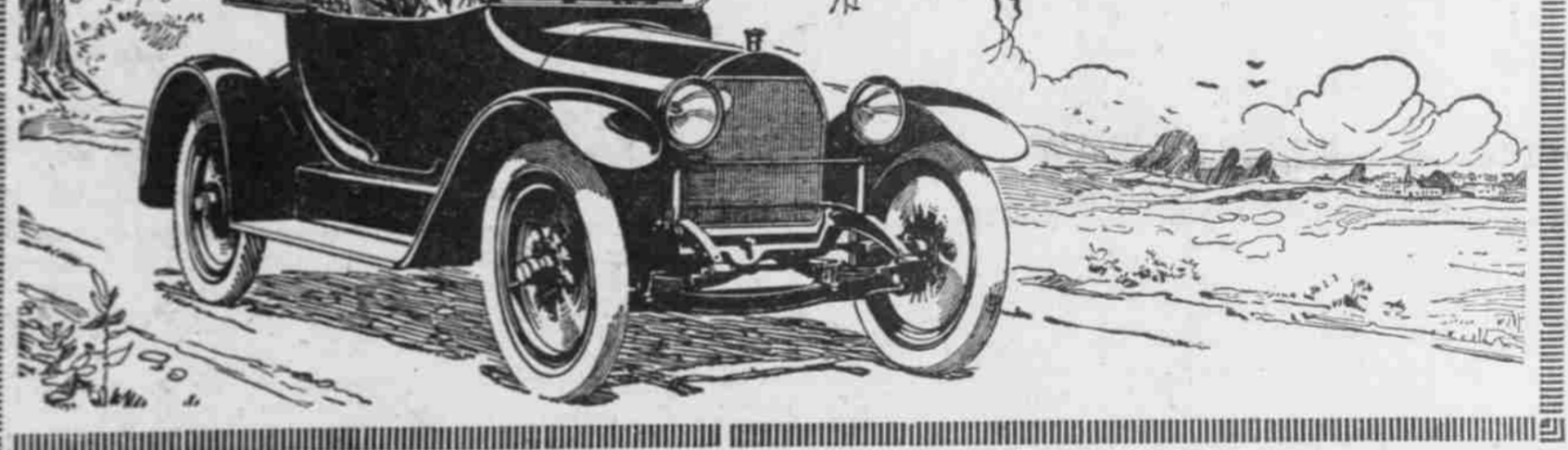
