

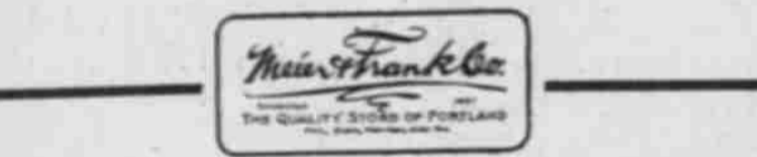

## AID CARRIED TO ILL BY SALE OF SEALS

Mrs. Sarah Evans Reports on Work Done to Relieve Tuberculosis Sufferers.

FUND IS AT \$4000 MARK

Oregon Chapter of National Association is Preparing for Annual Red Cross Stamp Campaign. Clubwomen Lead Hand.

While the Oregon chapter of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis is making active preparations for the annual sale of Red Cross seals, the State Federation of Women's Clubs, which had charge of the sales in former years, is distributing among tuberculosis sufferers in various parts of the state, the funds remaining in its possession.

Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, past president of the State Federation, and now chairman of the committee on public health.

Mrs. Evans has charge of the fund, which aggregates more than \$4000. However, the Federation is pledged to spend nearly half of this sum in the state outside of Multnomah County.

Such was the understanding with the various affiliated clubs that aided in the seal sales in the last few years—that money accruing from sales in Multnomah County should be expended in this county and that money raised outside Multnomah County should be spent in the state at large, says Mrs. Evans.

"In former years," explained Mrs. Evans yesterday, "the State Federation had charge of the sales in Oregon, but within the present year a state chapter of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis was formed here and as the National Association publishes the seal and has charge of the distribution throughout the country the sales for Oregon have been turned over to the new organization.

Clubwomen Support Campaign.

"The federated clubwomen are supporting the new organization in its campaign to conduct a successful sale this year.

"While the sales were in charge of the clubwomen much money was expended locally for relief among tuberculosis sufferers. The women conducted the work without charge for their services. The only expense was the money actually paid out for necessary supplies and hired help—aggregating about \$150 a year.

"It was the policy to retain a certain sum in the fund each year so that some large and 'worth while' work could be performed for the relief of tuberculosis sufferers. In this way the present fund of approximately \$4000 was accumulated.

"As early as last Spring officers of the Federation called into consultation various physicians interested in tuberculosis prevention and secured their individual ideas on how the fund was to be distributed. Their aim was to secure the greatest possible benefit from the money.

New Organization Formed.

"Meanwhile, however, the new organization was formed and there arose the possibility of turning the money over to that organization. But the club women's conviction at that time was to continue the work of the fund as they had been doing it for so long. In accordance with this action, we have proceeded to follow the instructions of the earlier conference and already have made provision for relief in the following cases:

"A man and wife, both victims of

tuberculosis, she in an acute stage and he but a little better, both penicils, are receiving \$30 a month.

"A working woman who has to stay at home to take care of her tubercular husband is getting \$10 a month.

"A small boy with tubercular joints, now under physicians' care, taken to a hospital, will receive \$10 a week to pay his hospital fees.

"We have set aside \$500 to be paid in monthly installments to the Visiting Nurse Association. The first check was drawn to cover the month of November. Arrangements have been made, also for a subscription—probably \$500—to the tuberculosis department of the Free Dispensary."

Other expenditures will be made in worthy causes as rapidly as they are discovered, says Mrs. Evans.

## FRIEND POWERLESS TO AID Doctor Strangles to Death With Tonsillitis, With No Help Near.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—A man and his wife and two children, Dr. Frank C. Kienzie, strangled to death in his apartment recently. Tonsillitis is said to have been the cause.

C. C. Kienzie, friend of the physician, told a graphic story of Dr. Kienzie's battle against strangulation.

"The doctor's groans awakened me about 5 o'clock this morning. He was rushing about his apartment trying to force the handle of a toothbrush down his throat. His face was black and his eyes were bulging.

"He was choking to death. At length he threw down the toothbrush, seized a spoon and tried to force that down his throat. He rushed toward us in his terrible agony. I thought I heard him mutter, 'Doctor.' I rushed to a telephone and called a physician, but it was too late.

"The doctor finally threw down the spoon and hurried himself on his bed. He rolled off that to the floor. He lay there motionless. When the doctor came my friend was dead."

O'Donnell, proprietor of the Seattle apartment-house where he was living, that he called Granville to the telephone on the early morning of February 12, showing that he was in his apartments on the night of February 12.
