It was on a chill November afternoon in 1883 that Pennsylvania Military College flashed the number system on the football world, and incidentally used the single signals as the means of a coup whereby Princeton was whipped at Chester by 7 to 0.

In defeating Princeton, Pennsylvania Military did not use trick plays or spring some new formations or work the "hoisting" stunt for the first time.

STANFORD INSISTS RUGBY IS NOT DEAD

Students Not Pleased by Talk of Return to American Game.

BREACH WIDER THAN EVER

Cardinal Men Declare Themselves Satisfied With Conditions and Say That Olive Branch Is Only for Other Sports.

If it were not for the fact that Stanford is as good as dead on the Pacific Coast and never again will the English game be played, these stories have declared that Stanford has found Rugby an entire failure and will discard it as such.

Stanford is unquestionably far fetched and due to a highly excited state of mind. At the same time, it shows how much larger the breach between the two institutions and is an indication that the breach cannot be easily bridged.

Stanford Not Ready to Change. I was talking to a Stanford man the other day, a former graduate manager at the university, and who keeps in close touch with the situation at the "Farm."

There are others who talk in a similar vein and it is apparent the rupture is more open than ever before. California, tied up to a contract with Washington, cannot back on the intercollegiate article and evidently has no desire to do so.

There is the financial standpoint as a result of the quarrel. A year ago, Harrisburg and Monroe High divided the big game which money was split fifty-fifty.

Perhaps after that has happened, the students at large will be more amenable to reason, more inclined to listen to talk of compromise.

Graduates of both the Blue and Gold and the Cardinal are attempting to stir up interest in some plan of arbitration that will produce results.

There isn't a chance, either for Santa Clara University to go over to California or to the University of California.

You may have read something during the week about the branch to California, tending the olive branch to Stanford.

It means more than perhaps people in the Northwest can appreciate for Santa Clara to be allied with Stanford, and that will hang out as long as the Cardinal.
