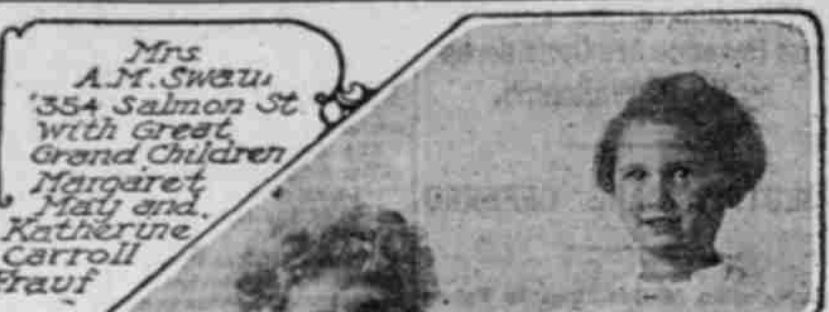

J. M. Mansfield Came to Oregon Across Plains in 1833.

J. M. Mansfield, who died suddenly at his home near Seaside, Lane County, November 28, aged 63 years, was born in Knox County, Illinois, May 11, 1846...

He was married to Nancy J. Allen at Mohawk, Lane County, January 9, 1868, and to this union was born 11 children. His wife and five children survive him. The children are: Mrs. Effie Deemer and Mrs. Matty Simas, both of Monument, Grant County; Mrs. May Porter, of Portland; Mrs. Sylvia Misenor, of Mitchell, Wheeler County; Frank Mansfield, of Seaside, Lane County.

In 1871 he moved his family to Tillamook County, where he made his home for seven years. Since then he has lived at Ochoco, Crook County, southwest of Mitchell, Wheeler County, and Seaside, Lane County.

He confessed Christianity in 1872, and in 1888 he was ordained to the ministry of the Baptist Church.

Preliminary Highway Work Begun. CHEHALIS, Wash., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—County Engineer Neville has a crew of men in the field this week doing preliminary work on the hard-surface pavement that will be built in Lewis County in 1916. The money available will all be spent on the Pacific Highway, and it is planned to pave three

miles. One mile will extend the pavement already laid northwest of Centralia to the Thurston County line, another mile will extend the pavement southeast of Chehalis an additional mile, while the third mile will be laid on the pavement lying northwest of Coville, prairie toward Chehalis from Toledo.
