"All Very Simple." Declares Mr. Evans, as He Explains Intricacies of Measure.

PROHIBITION IS MISNOMER

Manufacture and Sale Only of Intoxicants Forbidden and Limit Put on What Individual or Family May Procure.

enly to the purchaser in persent the deliveryman must present an affidavit blank, to which the consignes must sign and swear. He must swear that he is the person to whom the liquor is consigned and that he has not received more liquor than the quantity allowed him by law. expressman may charge cents for the affidavit.

The purchaser then may do enything he likes with the liquor except sell it.

No person or no family may

receive more than two quarts of spirituous or vinous liquofs (whisky, brandy, wine, rum, etc.), nor more than 24 quarts of mait liquors (beer, ale, porter, etc.), within a period of four

"It's very simple," said District Attorney Evans, crussing his knees and loiding his hands back of his head. Then he proceeded to explain Ore-gon's new "dry" law. Mr. Evans, as culef prosecuting officer of Multnomab County, will have to enforce the new law here. And after weeks of careful study he probably knows more about the law than the men who wrote it. "In the first place," said Mr. Evans, "It isn't a prohibition law, It isn't a dry faw at all.

The new law merely prohibits the manufacture and sale of intexicating fiquor. It doesn't prohibit the use of it. wipes out the saloon, the browery and the distillery." First, explained Mr. Evans, we must

know what this article is which we are prohibiting the sale and manufacture of. The law defines:

Intoxicating liquor - All spirituou mult, vinous or fermented liquors, and 70 TOTS IN INSTITUTION all mixtures or preparations likely to he used as a heverage, which contain more than one-half of one per cent of alcehol by volume, and all other mixtures which are intended to produce intoxicating liquor

Ethyl alcohol may be sold by druggists to individuals or families in he larger amounts than two quarts in four weeks. It can be furnished only for modicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical and scientific purposes. If medicinal, the prescription of a physician must be filed with the affidavit. For other pur-poves the affidavit must state the exact

Multnemah County is printing blank affidavit forms, to be kept in stock by express and railroad companies and

The blanks will cost the druggists and common carriers 51 cents for 106. They may charge five cents for making the affidavit. In some states a "mear-dry" law was knocked in the head by the courts because no compensation was allowed common carriers and druggists for taking affivadits. Hence, the five-cent charge allowed in

the Oregon law, Express companies will have the regular common-carrier blanks, to be filled out and signed by the person re-ceiving liquor from outside the state. All fiquor must be delivered to the con-signes in person. Nobody else may sign for bins.

Liquor may not be shipped into the Liquor may not be shipped into the state C. O. D. In that case it would be considered sold within the state.

Affidavits taken by common carriers and prescriptions and affidavits in drugstores are to be kept on file. Each one must be numbered. At any time they must be accessible to any court or any officers of the law.

The County Clerk must preserve the affidavits and prescriptions for two years.

Violation of the law for first of-fense, is penalized by a fine of not more than \$500, or imprisonment in the County Juli not more than six months. For accord violation the fine may not be less than \$100 nor more than \$500. he has than \$100 nor more than anothers than 10 days nor more than one year. For a third offense, two years in the County Jall is the penalty, and the punishment may not be suspended by

The latter course will deal with such questions as the cost of production, the maintenance of fertility in orchard soils, clover crops and diversification in fruit growing, together with attention to marketing problems.

Professor C. I. Lewis will have charge of this course. The courses in pruning and spraying will be in charge of Professor V. R. Gardner.

Conferences to Be Personal.
A feature of the horticultural programme will be personal conferences at special hours, when growers are invited to discuss their special problems with the college specialists. Horticultural problems of Eastern Oregon will receive the attention of R. W? Allen, superintendent of the limitally branch superintendent of the Umatilla branch

Mr. Allen will take up the questions of fruit growing under irrigation. Veg-etable gardening courses also will be
