

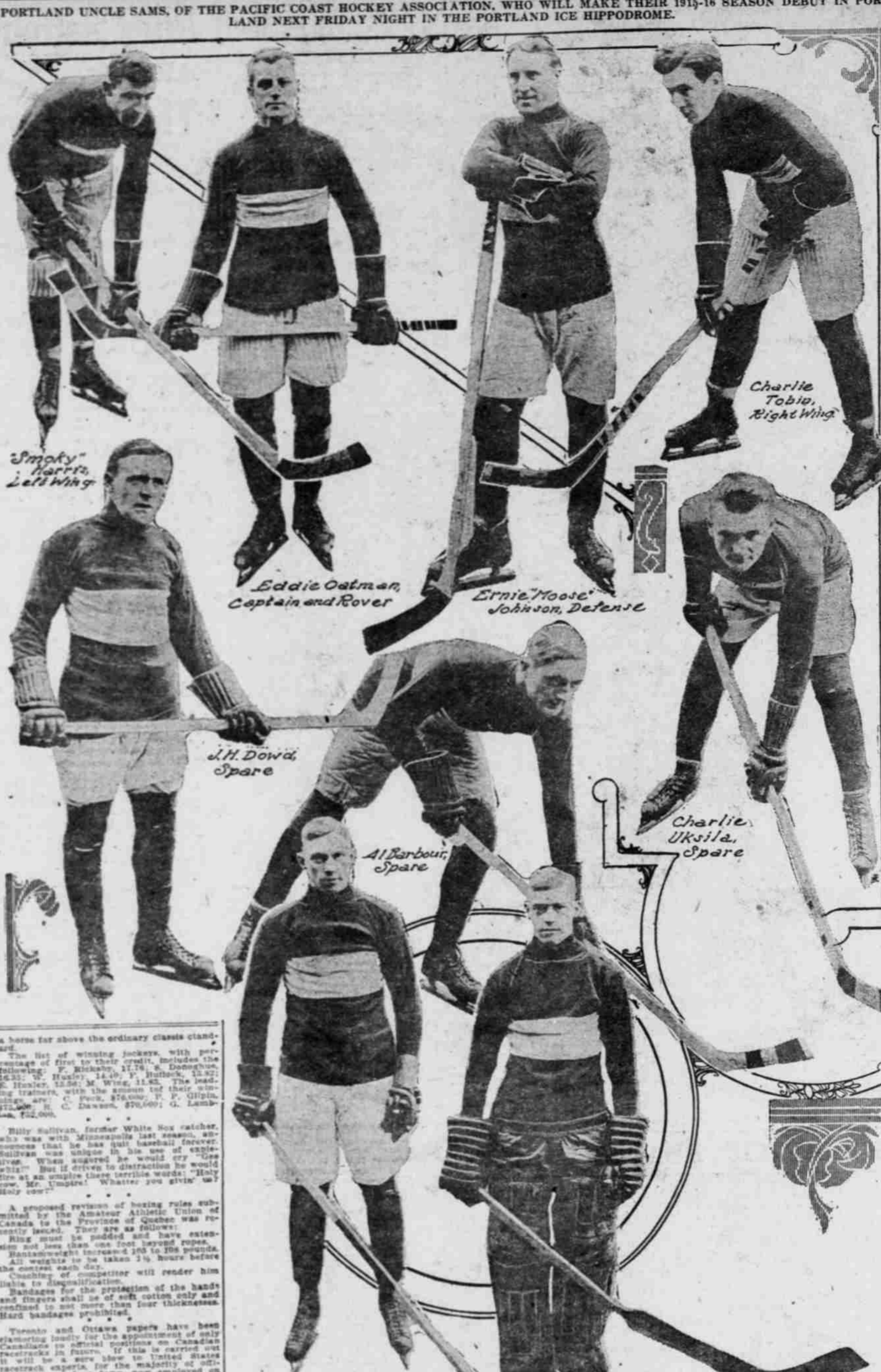

STREAMS CLOSED TO ANGLERS

Scarcity of Fish Near Silverton Causes Action by Commission.

SILVERTON, Or., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—The State Fish and Game Commission has posted notices in Silverton and vicinity that the fishing season in Butte Creek, the Aquila River and other streams and their tributaries will be closed from December 10, 1915, to March 31, 1916.

The reason for closing the fishing season in these particular streams is that the stock of trout and other fish is fast being cleaned out and in the interest of sport the fish and game commission has issued the order prohibiting fishing in any of these streams in any form.
