Medals and Crosses Pinned on Breasts of Modest Soldiers by General.

MERE BOY IS AMONG THEM

Correspondent Describes Touching Ceremony, of Which Mother's Pride in Son's Achievements Is Striking Feature.

PARIS, Nov. 12.—The tramp of many feet in the distance, an occasional bar of music carried up to us by some playful breeze, we strained our eyes down the long concourse across the Pont Alexandre III, but could see nothing except the long lines of expectant people on either side of the curb.
