### FORD TO BE IGNORED

Holland Will Give No Recognition or Support.

NOTICE IS NOT ANSWERED

If Party's Activities Become Embarrassing Invitation to Transfer Headquarters Probably Will Be Extended.

THE HAGUE, via London, Dec. 11 .-Neither encouragement, ecognition nor support in any form will be offered to the Ford peace party by The Notherlands government, according to infor-mation from official sources given to a correspondent of the Associated Press. Government officials, it was indicated, naturally noted the party's de-parture and also received a notifica-tion thereof from the leader, but no reply was forwarded.

No opposition, however, will be placed in the way of the party's landing in Helland, but, should the activities of members become \*mbarrassin; while there, they will in all probability be requested to transfer their head-quarters to other than Dutch territory. Private pacificists, of whom there are many in this country, probably will welcome the Ford party as an addition


