WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Postmaster-eneral Buriesen's annual report, made shife tenight, says the European war public tenight, says the European war has cout the American postal services \$11,500,500, but that economies of administration have reduced the audited deficit to a little more than \$11,500,500 for the fiscal year which ended last June.
