### COOK COMING HOME

Explorer on Way Through Siberia to New York.

### TRAVEL TROUBLES MANY

Party, Ordered Deported From Calcutta, Finds Difficulty in Getting Passage and Journey From Port to Port.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 25.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, an American explorer, who went to India in June to ascend the Himalaya Mountains and was detained in India for five weeks as a German spy, is making his way across Siberia, intending to return to New York, according to E. S. Brooks, a motion-picture operator, with Cook's party.

### CHEESEMAKERS TO MEET

Holstein Breeders Also Will Convene and Discuss Problems Vital to Agricultural Development and Success.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 25.—(Special.)—One of the most important features of the programme arranged for Farmers' week at the Oregon Agricultural College, January 3 to 8, is the number of conferences and conventions devoted to the dairy interests of Oregon.

In addition to the meetings of the Oregon State Dairyman's Association and the Oregon State Breeders' Association, there will be a convention of the Oregon Butter and Cheesemakers, the Oregon Holstein Breeders' Association, the Jersey Cattle Club and the Guernsey Breeders' Association.

Among the noted dairy breeders and operators to be present at the conferences are: A. J. Glover, editor of Hoard's Dairyman; Mrs. Addie Howie, of Wisconsin, who recently became an exponent of the temperance theory in the handling of dairy cows; L. D. Graham, Portland, editor of Rural Spirit; E. C. Schroeder, a noted Wisconsin dairy breeder; Mrs. A. J. Hughes, Oregon City; H. Thiessen, secretary, Guy Hewitt, Monmouth; Herb Jones, Amity; J. C. Pomeroy, Scappoose; W. K. Newell, Sehegers; David Moore, a noted Holstein breeder of Spokane; Governor Withycombe and others of National as well as local reputation in the various fields of the dairy industry.
