BAN PRANCISCO, Dec. 25 .- Dr. Frederick A. Cook, an American explorer who went to India in June to ascend the Himalaya Mountains and was de-tained in India for five weeks as a German spy, is making his way across Siberts, intending to return to New York, according to E. S. Brooks, a mo-tien-picture operator, with Cook's

Brooks left Dr. Cook and his companion. F. P. Thompson. November 26 at Yokohama, Japan, and arrived here today on the steamer Dairen Maru.

Brooks confirmed previous reports that Dr. Cook and members of his party failed to obtain permission to attempt the ascent of the Himahayas, the object of Dr. Cook's expedition, and that Dr. Cook was detained at Ranguon. India, for five weeks.

The three men in the party were ordered deported from Calcutta, Brooks said, but had difficulty in getting passage on outgoing vessels. They were forced to travel from port to port, going from Calcutta to Colombo, Ceylon, then to Singapore, and finally to Manila.
