

420 CASES TAKEN TO SUPREME COURT

Each Justice in Year Handles 58 of 381 Disposed Of and 180 Remain.

WORK IS 7 MONTHS BEHIND

The Attorneys Are Admitted to Bar and Fees Used to Swell Fund for Law Library. Slight Decrease Under 1914.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 1.—(Special.)—During the past year 420 cases were appealed to the Supreme Court, according to records in the office of J. C. Moreland, clerk of the court, who completed a summary of the business done in 1915 today. Of the transcripts coming before the court, 353 were filed at Salem and 67 at Pendleton. In 1914 448 transcripts were filed on appeal.

The seven justices disposed of 381 cases during the year, 124 by written opinion and 257 by stipulation. The number of opinions written on the merits was 234, on motions 73 and dissenting opinions none, or a total of 307.

The average number of opinions for each of the seven justices this past year was 54, as compared with 63 in 1914. There are now 180 cases on the trial docket ready for hearing. It is estimated that the court is approximately seven months behind in the work on hand.

In the year just closed 118 attorneys were admitted to practice law in Oregon. The fees received for admitting them totaled \$285, as compared with \$215 received from the same source in 1914. This money is turned into the law library fund.

General filing fees and cash receipts for 1915 amounted to \$12,345.53, as compared with \$12,514.68 the year before. The total cash receipts this year amounted to \$15,794.55, while in 1914 the total receipts were \$12,514.68.

GIRL OF 15 IS MISSING

MISS EULEMA HOMINE, VANCOUVER, NOT SEEN SINCE DECEMBER 24.

No Trace Found of Loss Who Never Returned After Visiting Home of Her Brother.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 1.—(Special.)—Miss Eulema Homine, 15 years old, has mysteriously disappeared and nothing has been heard of her by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Homine, since 2 o'clock December 24, 1915.

Miss Homine left her father's place on the St. Johns road near Vancouver and went to the home of her brother, John Homine, at 389 East Fourteenth street, the day before Christmas. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon she left without her cap or bag, to call on a friend, Mrs. Mahol Christianson, who lived near there. And that is the last seen of her by any of her relatives.

She weighed about 13 pounds, had light brown hair, dark gray eyes, wore a gray sweater and blue skirt, and had no hat or cap. She had two scars on her wrist, caused when she fell through a glass window. A small scar on the base of the left side of her nose is plainly visible.

Whether the girl was kidnapped or whether she ran away from home is a mystery.

BAKER RECEIPTS GAINING

Postmaster Foster Says Quarter Shows \$9146.92 as Figures.

BAKER, Or., Jan. 1.—(Special.)—A general gain in postal receipts is shown in the report issued by Postmaster Foster today. In December, 1915, \$9541 was taken in at the local office, and in December, 1914, \$9173 received the receipts, making a gain of \$368 in the month.

In November, 1915, \$2309.93 was received, giving December the advantage of \$123.30. Christmas business was largely responsible for this.

For the quarter ending last night, the receipts were \$2446.82, while for the same period in 1914 receipts measured \$2111.26, making a gain of \$335.56.

TILLAMOOK LEVY IS FIXED

Budget for Roads in North and to Bayview Raised.

TILLAMOOK, Or., Jan. 1.—(Special.)—About 180 representatives of the various Commercial Clubs, Port Commissioners, grange, timber companies and other interested organizations of the county attended the tax budget meeting here Thursday.

Porter Realty Company, the owner of Bayview, put with that sum enough to guarantee the completion of the road next summer. In event of their failure to sign a contract it seemed the sense of the meeting that the sum be diverted to the south end of the county for hard surfacing a trunk road.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 1.—(Special.)—With County Judge Charles Marsh playing the role of peacemaker, a reconciliation was effected yesterday between Mr. and Mrs. Albert Bennett at Pendleton. The infant child around which the controversy between them arose, will be taken care of by both father and mother, although temporary custody of the child is given the mother.

The affair grew out of Bennett's kidnapping the babe last Sunday from a granary in Milton after Bennett and his wife had separated. The reconciled couple left the courtroom arm in arm with the baby between them.

DAYTON THEATER BURNED
