



CARE URGED IN PLAN OF IRRIGATION BOND

Sound Financial Policy Back of State Guarantee Advocated by F. T. Griffith.

INVESTIGATION IS ADVISED

Issue to Run 15 Years With No Payment on Principal During First Five Suggested-Supervision by Board Is Planned.

A sound financial policy must be maintained if the state undertakes to guarantee irrigation bonds issued by private enterprises, says Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, who has given a large share of atten-

tion to this question.
"But it should not be difficult to

"But it should not be difficult to devise a plan that would thoroughly protect the interests of the state and at the same time aid in developing a large proportion of our irrigable land," he said yesterday.

"And if the state proposes to guarantee the bonds of irrigation districts it should extend the same advantages to drainage districts. There is as much need for one kind of development as there is for the other.

Formation of Districts Advocated, To obtain state aid of this kind, irrigation or drainage districts should be formed. The land should be selected carefully, so that none but that which is capable of development might be included. Ample provision should be made, in the case of irrigation districts, for an adequate supply of water. The land might be over so susceptible of development under irrigation, but might not be anywhere within access of water.

"All the facts in connection with any enterprise should be available and at hand before the bonds are issued. The law should permit the formation of irrigation and drainage districts and all land capable of development within those districts should be included and made subject to the bonding act."

Mr. Griffith suggests that the bonds should run for a period of about 15 years, with no payments on the principal required for the first five years. This would give the settler time to get his land in shape before being called upon for any of the principal.



Project Investigation Suggested.

Every project, he explained, should be submitted to the investigation and analysis of a board of public works, made up of men familiar with the various branches of irrigation and drainage work.

"No bonds schould be issued," he added, "by any irrigation or drainage districts until the project itself and the bond issue has been approved by this board of public works.

"When the bonds are issued the state should purchase them all at par and deposit them in the State Treasury.

"The state then should issue its own bonds against these improvement bonds, but at a lower rate of interest. The funds from the sale of the state's bonds should be used in developing the approved projects.

"The state then would retain the difference in the interest for the supervision of the projects and also create a fund against the possible failure of any district that it develops in this manner.

"But in my opinion the failures will be few if the proposed board of public works is composed of capable men."
