LAYMEN PLAN FOR MISSION CAMPAIGN

Churches Unite in Effort to Awaken Interest and to Meet Local Problems.

Noted Speakers From East Are to Assist in Convention for Which Committees Now Are Busily Arranging—Expense Met.

An immense amount of pent-up energy will be released at the forthcoming Laymen's Missionary Convention of Oregon, to be held in Portland, February 13, 14, 15 and 16. The preliminary announcement contains the statement: "No collections will be taken, nor will any appeals for money be made at the convention. The expense will be met by a registration fee of \$1. on payment of which each delegate will receive a delegate's card admitting to all sessions of the convention."

The purpose of the campaign is to consider new world conditions and America's responsibility; to study the missionary progress of recent years; to project plans to accomplish full missionary duty; to emphasize the adequacy of the Gospel to meet modern social conditions; to increase the spiritual power and efficiency of the local church; to secure the general use of the best methods of missionary education and finance; and to inspire laymen to take their part in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.
