

# SUFFRAGISTS WIN POINT IN SENATE

### Committee Makes Favorable Report on Amendment, Ignoring Party Lines.

## BALLOT IS HELD LOGICAL

Both Sexes Declared to Have Common Political Destiny—Lesson of War Is That Women Have Share in Sacrifices.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The Susan B. Anthony amendment providing for woman suffrage was reported favorably to the Senate by the suffrage committee.

In our opinion, every principle upon which universal manhood suffrage rests demands the extension of its privileges and responsibilities to women," said the report. "They are subject to the laws, are taxed for the support of government, and, with men, to a common political destiny."

After pointing out that the Government of the United States is one of delegated powers, the report says: "Manhood suffrage has been from time to time extended. Every enlargement of the franchise has been a natural and logical development of the principle of popular sovereignty."

**Suffrage Not Limited to Half.**  
"We may assume that universal male suffrage is an established fact in our system of government."

"Woman comprises 50 per cent of our population. They are citizens in all other respects. Together with the men they constitute the people, the citizenry, the intelligence, devotion to welfare of the Government and in capacity for franchise they are in no wise inferior to men."

"Neither logically nor justly, therefore, can unlimited suffrage be recognized as an essential to the republican form of government, and its extension at the same time be limited to one-half of the people, arbitrarily segregated from the other half by the accident of sex."

**Suffragists in War Noteworthy.**  
"Woman's activities, her participation, sacrifices and misfortunes in the great conflict now raging over three continents have for all time stamped on the conscience that she should not be armed with the ballot because she cannot wield the sword."

The report was signed by Senators Thomas, Owen and Hollis, Democrats; and Sutherland, Clegg and Jones, Republicans. Senator Brandegee, Democrat, voted for the report, but his name does not appear on it. Senator Catron, Republican, of New Mexico, dissented, and Senator Johnson, Democrat, of South Dakota, did not sign the report.

## REPORT DEFENDS PIUTES

"Shameful Neglect" Said to Have Extended Over 20 Years.

DENVER, Jan. 8.—Charges that tribes with the Piute Indians near Utah, early in the present century, drove certain non-reservation Indians off the public domain and confiscated their grazing lands, made by M. K. Sullivan, special investigator of the Indian Rights Association, in a report published today.

The report declares that conditions of "shameful neglect" at the Utah Mountain Indian Agency extended over 20 years.

The troubles became acute last winter when United States officers endeavored to arrest Tee-Ne-Oat on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of Juan Chacon, a Mexican sheep herder in March, 1914.

## ALIASES ARE CONFESSED

One of Accused Smugglers Fined in Portland for Previous Offense.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—Two men, indicted by the Federal grand jury here yesterday, under the names of William Vines and H. Franklin, on charges of smuggling opium into the United States from Mexico, confessed today that they are Alexander Gladstone, an art dealer, and H. Friedman, both of San Francisco, according to John R. Elliott, United States Collector of Customs.

Gladstone, who is said to own an art goods store in Portland, was once fined \$100 in Portland, Or., on a charge of having opium in his possession, according to Collector Elliott.

## GRAPE MEN OPEN FIGHT

California to Ask Compensation if States Goes Dry.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—A vigorous campaign against the proposed constitutional prohibition amendments to be voted on next November, was opened here today by the California Grape Protective Association. It was decided to draft an initiative amendment to the constitution to provide for state compensation for loss sustained by growers and wine makers should either of the two proposed amendments be passed.

It was declared by two speakers that the agitation for a dry California, came from interests within the state. L. A. Wetmore, of San Francisco, charged that the Anti-Saloon League was an incorporated commercial concern, which had professional dry agitators.

**MOTHER BEHEADS BABE**  
Week-Old Daughter Slain in Moment of Acute Insanity.

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 8.—Mrs. Samuel Holmstrom, wife of a railroad man, during an attack of what physicians called acute insanity, today secured a butcher knife, drove a nurse from the house, slashed her own week-old daughter from a crib and carved off the child's head. She then plunged the knife into her own throat, inflicting wounds that probably will cause her death.

## ADA REHAN IS DEAD

Actress Succumbs to Operation for Arterial Malady.

## ILLNESS IS PROLONGED

First Appearance on Stage Made at Age of 14, and Best Remembered Role That of Ophelia in "Hamlet," With Edwin Booth.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Ada Rehan, the actress, died in Roosevelt Hospital here today after an operation for an arterial malady. She had been ill for several months and entered the hospital eight days ago.

Miss Rehan, whose real name was Ada Crehan, was born in Limerick, Ireland, April 22, 1869, and as a child came to New York. Educated in Brooklyn, she made her first appearance on the stage at the age of 14. From then on she played leading parts. She is perhaps best remembered as having played Ophelia in "Hamlet" with Edwin Booth. Her last public appearance was in 1904.

For 28 years, from 1879 until 1907, Miss Rehan was under the management of Augustin Daly, playing such characters in Shakespearean and old comedies, in addition to Ophelia, as Rosalind, Katherine, Viola, Beatrice, Portia and Lady Teague. She also played Peggy in "The Country Girl" and appeared in other modern comedy parts. She was with Augustin Daly until his death.
