EFFICIENCY GROWTH PLAN

Naval Militia Gunnery Record, Ri fle Team Work, Summer Camp and Inspections Are Mentioned Prominently in Document.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 8 .- (Special.) -- A. tribute to the officers and men of the Oregon National Guard, who give up the State of Oregon without compen-mation other than "the satisfaction which accrues from service," is the feature of the annual report of George A. White Adjutant-General, for 1915, filed today with Governor Withycombe. An observer "cannot fall to believe that unselfish patriotism continues to be a dominant trait in ter," says General White in conclusion

The report shows by means of statistics that the Guard administration in 1815 has brought about increased efficiency by reorganization and elimination of useless officers. Correspondence is cited to show the satisfaction of the War Department at the spirit of co-operation in the Oregon National Guard administration.

The record of the reorganized Naval Militia, which led all similar organizations in the country in gunnery practice in 1818, is preminently mentioned. All requirements of the War Department have been compiled with, the report says.

Since taking charge, General White states, he has entirely changed the system of records and disbursements, which now are systematized. Errors have been corrected and a refund of shortages secured.
